What is Human Trafficking?





Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000

- Commercial Sex Acts or Labor
 - ✓ Force
 - ✓ Fraud
 - ✓ Coercion
 - ✓ <u>NOT</u> Required for Minors
- Commercial = exchange anything of value (e.g., food, shelter, etc)

Myth vs. Reality

MYTH:

Only females experience sex trafficking.

REALITY:

Anyone can experience sex trafficking.

MYTH:

Trafficking always involves transporting people across borders.

REALITY:

Human trafficking does not require any movement.

MYTH:

People in trafficking situations want help to escape.

REALITY:

Self-identification as a trafficking victim happens along a continuum.

MYTH:

Children & youth are trafficked by people they do not know.

REALITY:

Youth are often trafficked by someone they know.

A Look At the Problem

- Important predictors of sex trafficking are running away from home and homelessness
- History of trauma especially sexual abuse
- History of foster care
- Juvenile justice involvement



Missing Youth Cases

Omaha Police Department Statistics

22

31 arrests made with 22 convictions to date

Average sentence – 21 yrs* one life sentence *

Missing Youth Services Program

- Started in September 2018
- Review hundreds of OPD missing youth reports per month
- Focus on non-system involved youth
 - No Child Welfare Involvement
 - No Juvenile Justice Involvement
- Youth Served:

• **2019**: 3227 reports – 79 youth

• **2024**: 2603 reports – 196 youth





How It Works

Receive reports from OPD

Warm call to caregiver of missing youth to offer an interview & services

OPD determines need to transport youth to Project Harmony

Interview with youth, screening for trafficking and medical exam offered

Separate interview with caregiver



Anti-Trafficking Youth Services Program

- Started in October 2021
- OPD data revealed youth at high-risk for sex trafficking (Feb. 2019 – Aug. 2021)
- Utilized NCMEC high-risk factors for sex trafficking
- Identified 521 at-risk youth





Identifying At-Risk Youth



OPD's High-Risk Factors

- Current State Ward
- History of Child Abuse/Neglect
- History of Sexual Abuse
- History of Substance Use/Abuse
- 3 or More Missing Youth Reports

Additional Criteria

- Unexplained Cash
- Unexplained Cell Phones
- Hanging Out With Older Men
- Located in Motels
- Other Juvenile Reports



Commonality Examples



Victim 1 • State Ward

- 14 CPS intakes before 1st run
- 28 CPS intakes before 1st S/T disclosure
 - Alleged substance & child abuse
- 1st missing report at 13
- 1st sexual assault at 13
- 2nd sexual assault within 6 months
- 1st criminal charge at 15
- Discloses trafficking at 17
- 36 police entries at time of disclosure
 - 17 missing reports
 - 4 sexual assault reports
 - Substance abuse



Victim 2 • State Ward

- 10 CPS intakes before 1st run
- 34 CPS intakes before 1st S/T disclosure
 - Alleged substance & child abuse
- 1st missing report at 11
- Suicide attempt at 12
- 1st criminal charge at 12
- Discloses sex trafficking at 12, 14, & 15
- 50 police entries
 - 24 missing reports
 - 3 sexual assault reports
 - 3 sex trafficking reports



Role of ATYS Specialist



• **REFERRAL:** OPD sends at-risk youth's information to Project Harmony – minor youth up to age 24 yr



MDT: Immediate MDT meeting with all related professionals prior to case acceptance



RELATIONSHIP: Establish relationship with youth and meet where they are



TRUST: Screen for trafficking using CSE-IT, set goals, connect to services



Benefits of a MATYS Program Within a CAC

Immediate investigations for youth who present with abuse/neglect allegations





Youth have access to CAC services:

- Interview
- Medical Exam
- Advocacy
- Crisis & Ongoing Therapy

Monthly Multidisciplinary Team



Complex Cases

- Vulnerable youth with extensive, unaddressed trauma history, drug abuse and long-term treatment needs
- Lengthy law enforcement investigations with limited resources and challenging barriers to overcome with prosecution
- Limited services and substantial gaps in resources, housing and other continuum of care needs
- Inadequate penalties for sex buyers

Final Sentencing Related to Furnas County Human Trafficking Case

Earlier this summer, a two-week trial ended with a jury finding Quinn guilty of 13 felonies, including counts of sex trafficking of a minor, first-degree sexual assault of a child, and the production of child pornography. To date, 18 other defendants have been arrested for crimes associated with Quinn's actions.












Combined Trafficking Ring – Omaha

- Controlling






Types of Pimps



- Uses violence
- Tendency to target survival needs

- Love
- Charismatic





Trafficking Youth



Vulnerability

- Traffickers target needs that are not being met
- Basic, emotional, & family needs common vulnerabilities

Manipulation


- Trips to the mall
- Perceived love

Bonding

- The process creates very strong relationships
- Trauma bonding



Case Example



Youth Involved

- 8 youth identified 5 known victims of trafficking
- Started when youth were 12-13 yr

Perpetrator

- 37 yr old business owner
- Used his daughter's Facebook to meet girls
- Initially charged for sexual assault after youth disclosed at hospital

Investigation

Evidence gathered over time – match police reports similarities –
 victim statements – digital evidence – perpetrator details (locations, vehicle, abuse patterns, etc.)





Case Example



Prosecution

- Over 3 years (typically 18 months 2 ½ years)
- Federal Plead
- Sentenced to 35 years federal prison
- \$200,000 fine
- Restitution for victims

Support For Victim

- Recognition of abuse Report It
- Victim's disclosure and cooperation through sentencing nearly 3 years
- Consistent Victim support and services to maintain engagement





OPD & Project Harmony Statistics

Youth Served - 2024

- ATYS Specialists served 135 clients ages 12-24 years
- 21 youth staffed at High-Risk MDT
- Currently only serve Omaha Police Department jurisdiction

Investigations - July 2024

- 36 task force investigations for sex trafficking led by OPD
- 48 confirmed juvenile victims of sex trafficking
- 31 arrests made
- 22 convictions to date
- Average sentence 21 years (1 life-in-prison sentence)





Where do we go from here?





- Recognized a need to bring awareness to this hidden issue after working in partnership with OPD and key partners.
- Began discussions with key community leaders: Mayor,
 Chief of Police, DHHS, CA's, MOAC, Attorney General's
 Office, Governor, etc.
- ALL agreed it was time for action and a need to expand our services to entire Omaha Metro Area – Sarpy County















PREVENTION: Bring awareness and education to our community to foster a safer environment for our children, to include effective messaging strategies for reducing supply and demand.






PROTECTION: Provide a comprehensive continuum of care to survivors to promote healing and a long-term environment for them to thrive.





PROSECUTION: Support and strengthen legal framework and law enforcement to ensure traffickers and those who exploit survivors are brought to justice, serving as a deterrent to future crimes.

What Can You Do?

Recognize the Signs of Trafficking

- School attendance issues
- Frequently missing from home
- Exhibits signs of physical trauma or withdrawn behavior
- Lacks control over schedule
- Shows signs of drug addiction
- Coached/rehearsed responses
- Not allowed to speak

- Sudden change behavior
- Sexual terminology beyond age
- Has secret online profiles or references dating websites
- Tattoos
- Much older boyfriend or girlfriend
- Possesses hotel keys, cash, or cell phones
