Nebraska Youth Diversion Model Programs Guide

The Nebraska Crime Commission is excited to announce the release of the Nebraska Youth Diversion Model Program Guide (2025)—a practical, resource-rich tool designed to help counties and diversion programs implement evidence & cultural based practices for youth.

Most young people engage in impulsive or risky behavior at some point. The good news? Research shows that most will not re-offend, even without court involvement. That's where diversion comes in. Effective diversion programs intervene with youth before they enter the formal justice system, connecting them to supports that help redirect their path without the long-term consequences of system contact.


This work has never been more important. Despite declining crime rates nationally, Nebraska is one of only five states where incarceration rates are rising. Diversion and community-based alternatives are key strategies for addressing this trend—helping youth early.

Studies are clear: any exposure to the juvenile justice system—even simply stepping into a courtroom—raises the likelihood of future system involvement, including as an adult. By reducing this exposure and offering timely interventions, diversion programs can change the trajectory for Nebraska youth and strengthen communities statewide.

- Guidance to ensure consistency and quality across counties
- Tools for tracking outcomes and improving services






MAYSI-2

The Nebraska Crime Commission will be purchasing several licenses for counties to utilize the Massachusetts Youth Screening Instrument – Second Version (MAYSI-2), a scientifically validated mental health screening tool designed to identify pressing behavioral and emotional needs among youth entering the juvenile justice system. Developed by Dr. Thomas Grisso and Dr. Richard Barnum, the MAYSI-2 provides a brief yet powerful means for front-line staff to screen for mental health concerns within minutes. The Nebraska Screen and Assessment Tool (N-SAT) is designed for diversion programs to assess risk, needs, and to identify if additional mental health screening is necessary; the MAYSI-2 provides this additional screening for diversion programs to identify immediate mental health needs. Many counties already utilize this tool, but now it will be available to all counties.
