
Our Vision:

ACCC Programs & Services

The Asian Community & Cultural Center provides provide culturally sensitive services to Karen, Vietnamese, Chinese, Ukrainian, Sudanese, Afghan (Dari/Farsi and Pashto), and Yezidi families, and other Central Asian/Middle Eastern families that speak Arabic.

Our main program areas include:

- **Essential Resources Program** (includes case management, Citizenship classes, English for Driving, and more)

- Youth Program
- Health Education & Advocacy Program

- Juvenile Justice Prevention through programs, support services, and ensuring youth have a trusted adult in their life.

Our Approach to Individual Services: Mentoring

We meet one-to-one in-school with youth with a Youth Program Coordinator or

Advocate

- Academic support
- Emotional and mental health support
- Connection with a trusted adult
- Skill building
- College, job, and planning for life after high school
- Goal setting
- Resource sharing



Our Approach to Individual Services: Family Case Management

To holistically support youth, we connect families with Community Advocates and our Essential Resources, Women's, and Health Programs

- Case management includes:
 - Interpretation and translation services
 - Health and human services assistance
 - Educational classes
 - Peer support
 - Resource referrals and warm hand offs, and more



3 Case Examples

Supporting an Arabic Speaking Youth on Diversion

- Received referral that youth was interested in getting driver's license and a job
 - Details about the case were still unclear when we got involved
 - Noted struggles with school attendance and aggression towards family
- Supports to address truancy:
 - Conducted a home visit with Youth Program Coordinator and Community Advocate
 - Introduced our in-school mentoring program
 - Contacted EL teachers and social worker for more context
 - Transportation to school
 - The family lost bus transportation
 - We requested bike donations

Supporting an Arabic Speaking Youth on Diversion (cont.)

- Supports provided to mom
 - Community Advocate translation, interpretation, basic needs
 - Built trust with Advocate and then opened up about what was really going on
 - Encouraged her to make a police report
 - Addressed barriers and struggles with making a police report
- Informed the youth of consequences
 - He spoke about his fear regarding his status as an immigrant
- Outcomes
 - Youth reported being motivated to attend school and stop aggression towards family
 - Connecting with sister to provide support and continuing to support mom

Supporting a Karen Youth with Prevention

- Karen family from Thailand single mother and three children
 - Initial involvement with our agency through an after school program
 - Eldest daughter joined the program when she was in 6th grade
 - Identified to be struggling with mental wellness
 - Conducted home visit to meet family and gain insight into home life
 - Support provided for mother and younger sisters
 - Application Assistance
 - Transportation Assistance
 - Mentoring and Summer Programming
 - Emotional support for mother and eldest daughter
 - Continued home visits from Youth Program Coordinator(s) and a Karen Community Advocate

Supporting a Karen Youth with Prevention Cont.

Outcomes

- Supporting the whole family has better helped us to support the individual youth
- Youth successfully transitioned from middle school to high school and is working a part time job
- Supporting younger sister through mentoring and an after school program
- Increased family involvement with our services

Supporting a Karen Youth through the Juvenile Justice System

• Started working with youth in 6th grade in Youth Program

- Attended after school program and met with a Youth Advocate for 1:1 in-school mentoring
- Youth started to show some behavioral issues instigated by 8th grade peers
- Substance abuse and aggression increased
- Transferred to another middle school in 7th grade

Supports Provided to Family

- Karen Advocate began supporting the youth's mother, a single parent, throughout
 Juvenile Justice involvement
- Regular home visits
- Youth is still under probation, as he did not successfully graduate middle school

Supporting a Karen Youth through the Juvenile Justice System Cont.

Outcomes

- Youth is still under Probation in a 6 month out of home placement, as he did not successfully graduate middle school
- Support is still provided to family and Advocate visits youth regularly for updates and support
