Therefore, it is important to communicate effectively, understand the responsibilities and recognize the signs that indicate potential trouble.

It is equally important to act in a timely manner to address issues in their earliest stages to limit the exposure to liability.

A supervisor's job consists of many tasks that encompass the entire area of his/her responsibility. It is important to have a clear understanding of that area of responsibility and all of its associated tasks.
