REGULAR MEETING OF THE POLICE STANDARDS ADVISORY COUNCIL June 26, 2024

I. CALL TO ORDER

Chairman, Sgt. Drew Bolzer called the meeting to order at 9:00 A.M. Legal notice of the meeting was published in the Lincoln Journal Star on June 19, 2024. Roll call; Sgt. Drew Bolzer, Lt. Col. Buck Duis, Chief Paul Graham, Chief Deputy Greg London, Sheriff Dan Osmond, Chief Steve Reeves, Asst. Chief Jason Stille. Mr. Matt McCarthy and Deputy Chief Sherie Thomas were absent.

II. APPROVAL OF MAY 15, 2024 P.S.A.C. MINUTES

Sgt. Bolzer asked if there was a motion to approve the May 15, 2024 minutes.

MOTION

Sheriff Osmond: I'll make a motion that we approve the minutes from May 15th. Chief Graham seconded the motion.

Voting in favor: Lt. Col. Duis, Chief Graham, Chief Deputy London, Sheriff Osmond, Chief Reeves, Asst. Chief Stille, Sgt. Bolzer. Motion approved.

III. REPORTS

A. Director's Report

Director Mark Stephenson reported on the following:

- Kristine Sabata is the compliance coordinator and has been completing desk and field audits for compliance. 19 field audits have been conducted across the state. Positive feedback has been given on the process.
- There is a total of 17 completed applications for the 218th Basic. Applications will be accepted until July 26th. The 218th Basic will start August 26, 2024.
- There has been an increase in the number of 791 and de-certification investigations. 13 cases have been referred to the Attorney General's office for review. 3 cases are awaiting criminal dispositions. 4 pending

B. Deputy Director's Report

Deputy Director Gene Boner reported on the following:

- The 217th Basic class started May 29th with 50 students enrolled. Currently 42 enrolled. 5 were separated for academic failure, 2 removed by their agency, and 1 voluntary withdrawal.
- Patrol Rifle Instructor-19 students enrolled.
- Basic Jail Training-29 students enrolled.
- Supervision is scheduled for July 9-11 with 55 enrolled.

C. Nebraska State Patrol Training Academy

Sgt. Nick Plate reported on the following:

- 13 recruits graduated on June 14, 2024.
- Camp 70 is scheduled to begin with 11 recruits on July 8, 2024.

D. Crime Commission Report

Executive Director Bryan Tuma reported on the following:

- The Lt. Governor is convening a number of meetings across the State of Nebraska with different law enforcement agencies. Director Tuma will be attending as many as his schedule allows. The purpose is to reach out to law enforcement and request information on issues or concerns that law enforcement agencies are facing. The State Treasurer will be attending the meetings to gain an understanding on how property tax revisions or proposals will affect law enforcement. A meeting has already been held in Schuyler. Meetings are scheduled for Lexington and Kearney. More may be scheduled.
- Misconduct cases: Sara Bockstadter was appointed as a Special Assistant Attorney General to assist with the backlog of cases.
- Director Tuma thanked Sgt. Bolzer and Lancaster County Sheriff Terry Wagner for their participation in a meeting with the Lt. Governor and his Chief of Staff and others from the budget office. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the proposal to increase the number of instructors at NLETC. It has been proposed to increase the number of instructors from 7 to 14.
- If the Council has any suggestions for new legislation that process will start in July. Feel free to share anything with Executive Director Tuma.

- LB 631(Community Work Release and Reentry Centers Act) came out in the last session. Parole is no longer a separate entity in State government. It has been merged with the Department of Corrections. Executive Director Tuma encouraged the Council to read the bill.
- LB 876 (Newborn Safe Haven Law)-Requires a staffed law enforcement agency or fire department to be a reception point for those wanting to give up their newborn baby. Executive Director Tuma met with Health and Human Services to offer his assistance in reaching out to law enforcement agencies to help determine staffing requirements for the bill.
- Grants: State Crisis Intervention Program-This was a piece of Federal legislation. The original intent of the grant was to target red flag laws in states. Funds were being distributed without much Federal guidance. It's going to target mental health crisis intervention. The Crime Commission was tasked with creating a strategic plan and developing an advisory board. There will be a survey distributed to law enforcement agencies. The goal is get the State of Nebraska ready to receive those federal grants. 1.8 million dollars is already available to use. There will be 900,000 dollars per year over a 5 year period that will be available.
- The Governor is going to visit NLETC on August 23rd.
- Cody Thomas with the NE State Patrol is going to do a presentation at the annual IACP conference. He is putting together a recruitment presentation. He is disbursing a survey to the graduates of the last 5 NSP camps. Mr. Thomas asked if there could be something similar sent to NLETC graduates. Director Stephenson said he would send out that information on a Director's Update email.

Sgt. Bolzer stated that he had met with the agencies and the Lt. Governor regarding staffing levels and is very optimistic in the direction those meetings have been going.

IV. Old Business

A. Academy Staffing / Class Size

Director Mark Stephenson referenced the report distributed by Executive Director Tuma. There was discussion on starting a basic session with 55 enrolled and when the skills portion of the training began in week 5 the number would be reduced to 50. If no one had left training before week 5, the 5 extra people would be deferred to the next basic session. Director Stephenson recommended approval of proposal #3 in the report that would give authorization to hire 3 additional full time instructors that would allow the enrollment for a basic class to increase to 60 students. Director Stephenson has been comparing NLETC to what other states are doing regarding basic training. Those were discussed. The proposals are for temporary relief to enhance the program delivery. NLETC has not had any increase in staff but they have gone from 2 8-week basics to now 3

15 week basics, and also supervision, management, and instructor level courses. The staff also coordinates any outside training brought to NLETC.

Sgt. Bolzer stated that one of his concerns was that the short term solutions would not end up being the final solution.

Director Stephenson discussed the hiring process and the time it takes to get a new instructor hired and teaching classes.

Asst. Chief Stille asked what opportunities the staff had to attend classes in their subject areas to stay informed on new procedures. Director Stephenson that the instructors are State Special Deputies that are required to complete the same continuing education hours as other officers. Currently they have limited opportunities with all of their other duties and with juggling comp time and family time, but they do get the training needed to stay up-to-date with their duties.

Sheriff Osmond asked Director Stephenson what his recommendation was. Director Stephenson said he recommended staying at 50 students until more instructors were hired.

Sgt. Bolzer asked if the 5 extra people would be a strain on resources for the first 5 weeks of training. Director Stephenson responded that it is not a strain as they would start skills training with 50 students so the agencies of the 5 extra students would be taking the chance that someone would be withdrawn during the first 5 weeks in order to let their officer to complete the full 15 weeks. Director Stephenson has concern for the extra 5. If they are bumped to the next basic, will the agencies continue working with them so they can retain what they learned during the first 5 weeks of training as even during the skills portion of training, they will need to be able to recall what was taught in the classroom during the first 5 weeks.

Chief Deputy London asked about what happens if a student is injured during basic training. Do they come back for the next basic? Director Stephenson responded with the recycling process for the student. The injury would determine what they would need to come back for.

Executive Director Tuma will get clarity on the budget for the short-term proposal #3.

Sheriff Osborn asked that if it takes so long to get instructors to where they are teaching courses how does short-term proposal 3 benefit NLETC. Director Stephenson responded that while they are working to prepare for the classroom they would be available to help with scenarios that would cut down the number of outside guest scenario instructors and to assist the main instructor.

Chief Deputy London asked if Director Stephenson was optimistic that he could fill those 3 instructor positions. Director Stephenson responded that he could fill the positions and they would be viable instructors by January 1st. In the meantime they would be utilized with scenarios and assisting the lead instructors.

Sgt. Bolzer asked Mr. Stolz if the Council had the authority to make a recommendation to add instructors to the academy. Mr. Stolz responded that statutorily the Council is charged with running and overseeing the academy.

Chief Reeves asked how many who fail return to the academy. Director Stephenson responded that LB 51 changed those numbers. Before LB 51 the agencies could still work their employees as officers until they returned to the academy. Now since they are not allowed to work independently until they are certified, agencies are letting a lot of those failures go and move to the next applicant.

The Council discussed the different scenarios with having the basic start with 55 students. Director Stephenson reiterated that it would be the agency who would be taking the gamble that their student would not be bumped to the next academy at the start of the skills training, and they would be responsible for making sure their officers are working to retain the information they had in the first 5 weeks.

MOTION

Sheriff Osmond: I make a motion that for Basic 218 and 219 we allow up to the 55 students and if at the 5 week cutoff, it is not below 50 at that point, then those students will roll over to the next basic. And that would mean that starting in the 220th, if you still have roll-overs, you would lower your count to whatever that needs to be to make 50. Chief Deputy London seconded the motion.

DISCUSSION

Asst. Chief Stille stated he was dismayed at that option but would support it if those agencies that are affected by the motion are in agreement. Sgt. Bolzer stated that there were still some options available and Chief Deputy London stated that Sheriff Osmond would have additional motions.

Voting in favor: Chief Graham, Chief Deputy London, Sheriff Osmond, Chief Reeves, Asst. Chief Stille, Sgt. Bolzer. Voting against: Lt. Col. Duis. Motion approved.

MOTION

Sheriff Osmond: I also make a motion that we make a recommendation has a Council for proposal #3 in the short-term strategies that were provided to us. That is for the 3 additional FTE's to help support the increase in students that we are seeing. Chief Deputy London seconded the motion.

DISCUSSION

Sgt. Bolzer asked for clarification of the last sentence of proposal #3 and whether the reference to the NE State Patrol would be left in the proposal. Sheriff Osmond said he would leave the reference to the State Patrol in the proposal as it might help with the budgetary issues. Lt. Col. Duis stated that the State Patrol has helped and would continue to help as much as possible.

AMENDED MOTION

Sheriff Osmond: I'm going to amend my motion to strike the last sentence of proposal #3. So it would just be the first two sentences, so it doesn't involve the State Patrol. Chief Deputy London seconded the motion.

For clarification purposes: Short-Term Strategy proposal 3 reads, "The Crime Commission is seeking authorization for three additional FTE that would allow NLETC to hire three additional staff instructors immediately. Doing so would facilitate efforts to increase training session enrollment to 60 students."

DISCUSSION

Lt. Col. Duis asked if the 3 additional instructors were approved to be hired if that would come out of the 7 that NLETC ultimately is looking to hire. Director Stephenson confirmed that.

Voting in favor: Chief Deputy London, Sheriff Osmond, Chief Reeves, Asst. Chief Stille, Sgt. Bolzer, Lt. Col. Duis, Chief Graham. Motion approved.

Sgt. Bolzer asked if there were any other motions.

MOTION

Sheriff Osmond: I'll make one more motion that we recommend long-term strategy proposal #1 to increase the instructors to 14 positions. Chief Deputy London seconded the motion.

DISCUSSION

Sgt. Bolzer asked if that was the one that referred to the number of students. Sheriff Osmond clarified the number to meet or exceed 250 students annually.

Sgt. Bolzer asked Director Stephenson if NLETC gets their 14 instructors is there any discussion on how that will be coordinated over the year. Director Stephenson stated that there is a schedule mapped out.

For clarification purposes: Long-Term Strategy proposal #1 reads, "The Crime Commission in seeking approval and funding for seven FTE that would allow NLETC to hire additional staff instructors. This would increase the staff instructor cadre to 14 positions. The following outcomes could be achieved:

- Implement modifications to the basic certification training schedule staggering the start dates for two parallel training sessions.
- Increase student enrollment capacity to meet or exceed 250 students annually.
- Implement regional law enforcement training opportunities to support specialized training initiatives or annual continuing education requirements.
- Reduce the burden on local law enforcement agencies who historically provide voluntary instructors to supplement the NLETC staff instructor cadre.
- Maximize the potential programming and training opportunities available with the expansion of the NLETC complex.

Voting if favor: Sheriff Osmond, Chief Reeves, Asst. Chief Stille, Sgt. Bolzer, Lt. Col. Duis, Chief Graham, Chief Deputy London. Motion approved.

The Council took a break from 10:09-10:15 a.m.

B. TABE Scoring

Director Mark Stephenson distributed and summarized the "Comparison of Current TABE Scores to Newly Updated/Increased Score Numbers to Determine 11th Grade Equivalency per Title 79, Chapter 8, Section 006 handout to the Council members. The current scoring numbers show an overall 79% passing rate. The updated scoring numbers would have had an overall 41% passing rate. The data was gathered from 2022 to current. Director Stephenson clarified that he would have to check OPD and Lincoln P.D.'s numbers as the handout showed identical numbers for both agencies.

Sheriff Osmond asked what the statute specifically says. Mr. Stolz responded that 81-1410 says, "The Council shall adopt and propagate rules and regulations governing the minimum admission requirements for all training academies. Until the rules and regulations become effective the initial requirements exiting on July 13, 2000 pertaining to the training center shall be applicable. For all training academies except the Nebraska State Patrol." The existing statute at the time said, "The applicant is a high school graduate or possesses a GED and is able to read, write, and understand the English language at the 11th grade level." In 2005

Chapter 8 became effective which incorporated the read, write, and understand at an 11th grade level and it referenced the TABE test. In the March 2024 approved changes to Chapter 8, the reference to the TABE test was removed.

Sheriff Osmond asked whether the possession of a high school diploma would meet the standard. Mr. Stolz responded that the current rule and regulation contains the word "and" instead of "or", so the additional test is required unless Chapter 8 was amended. Chapter 8 refers to a test approved by the Council to determine the 11th grade level.

After much discussion about whether to adopt the new numbers or come up with a different test and when to implement the change, Sgt. Bolzer asked if there was a motion.

MOTION

Chief Deputy London: I'll make a motion that we table this issue. Sheriff Osmond seconded the motion.

Voting in favor: Chief Reeves, Asst. Chief Stille, Sgt. Bolzer, Lt. Col. Duis, Chief Graham, Chief Deputy London, Sheriff Osmond. Motion approved.

After the motion was approved a sub-committee was created to discuss the issue. Lt. Col. Duis, Mr. McCarthy, Asst. Chief Stille and Deputy Chief Thomas were named to the committee. If anyone named couldn't participate, Sgt. Bolzer would serve on the committee.

112		letter dated June 10 th 2024, a letter for reconsideration dated June 10 th 2024, a *
113		letter denying that reconsideration dated June 10 th 2024, and then an email where
114		the Lincoln Police Department provided their intent to appeal the decision to the
115		Police Standards Advisory Council dated June 11 th of 2024.
116	CHAIR:	Does either the petitioner or counsel have any objections to the receipt of these
117		exhibits?

CHIEF:

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Thank you. First, good morning. I appreciate the opportunity to be here in front of all of you as I apologize for my voice, it's just coming back to me in the last few days. I'm here today standing on behalf of the Lincoln Police Department, our Educational Personnel Unit, ... (unintelligible)...and our candidate who we have provided an offer to enroll in our academy. She has a disqualifier that you have been given notice of through the denials and the packet. I want to just touch on that a little bit. I realize that you have that for discussion. Just to give you a summary, and then I also want to share some additional information, so you have an assurance of who Ms. Hejl is, and why we want her to be a part of the Lincoln Police Department. So the disqualifier, in April of 2023 Ms. Heil was in college and was in the library studying late. She did not seek out. She did not go to purchase. A friend offered an Adderall pill for her to take and she made a choice at that period in time, wanting to stay up and study for finals and remain focused, she took that pill. What we found our investigation is that it is accurate that it is one time. That this is not a serious or a pattern that we found would challenger her ethics or character to be able to be a part of law enforcement in the State of Nebraska. specifically Chapter 8 other than this one that we are asking for. Ms. Hejl indicated that she knew a little after that it was a bad choice. She didn't like the way it made her feel and understood that wouldn't be a decision that she would make a second time. Our background investigation is very robust at the Lincoln Police Department and through that background investigation to references that we have, really exemplify who she is. After moving her forward they did put them through both a polygraph and psych. All of those came back in favor. We have followed up and believe that she has been honest with us and we don't question the integrity from her admitting to the violation and we appreciate that she brought it forward for our

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consideration and again I have some additional information that I would also to offer to you for review. Before reviewing that I want to share just a little bit about Addison because I want you to understand why we are sure and why we're really excited to have her as part of our organization. Just for a little bit of background. Again, you will go through this and what she has prepared. She is also ready to answer any questions, so I don't want to go into too much of this in case she's going to touch on it. But just a little bit about her. Speaking of her college, she graduated her four year college in three years, and she graduated cum laude. While she was at Wayne State she was on student senate. Her first year she was a...(unintelligible)...representative. The second year, she was a senator for the school of education and behavioral science. In her third year, again, graduating a year early, she was president of the student senate. She also then she decided to engage in, Wayne State has a lot of activities that she engages in. Specifically on the heritage side. She has been the Miss Czech-Slovak queen. Moving all the way up to US...(unintelligible)...and currently is on the Nebraska Czech-Slovak Queen pageant committee, volunteering her time in that capacity to develop the next generation of students in those roles. Addison also plays the accordion and volunteers her time to play the accordion in nursing homes. On the fine arts side, she is well decorated when it comes to the accolades in her time in speech competitions, play production competitions, and...(unintelligible)...interpretation and dramatic interpretation competitions. All of that has furthered her, to at this point, where she was a speech captain on her college on her college speech team and now is a certified speech judge and a certified play production judge. Her academic honors went on and on. She was on the Dean's List every year of college. She was involved in numerous...(unintelligible)...societies. Phi Alpha

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Delta, which is for freshman year, Pi Kappa Delta, which is in collegiate forensics. So that is a little bit here, I also want to touch on, I am going to present to you a lot of references, character references on her. Before I submit these for evidence I want to just touch on a couple of them. When I reviewed them it spoke to me and I feel it is imperative that you engage the conversation for consideration who we want staffing in our law enforcement agencies. Who are the next generation officers serving the community and becoming the leaders in our organizations. And these in particular speak to that. The first one comes from...(unintelligible)..who is from Wayne State. He was her advisor for three years. So on honesty, on question number four, how would you describe the applicant in terms of their honesty, trustworthiness. He talks about Ms. Hejl being extremely honest and trustworthy. Elected by her peers to be President of the Student Senate and responsible for administering a six figure budget while she was in college. How would you describe the applicant's reliability? Reliable to an absolute fault. Talked about her punctual, always arriving early and was here today and arrived early as well. About her, how did they, under assertiveness, how do they normally handle conflict? And we know that is something that our officers do every single day when they are out working with. He described her as calm in any situation. You know, what I already went over that she is experienced in speech and debate and that she tries to understand everyone's point of view and in the end will follow procedures and we believe she will make good decisions. That's the one I wanted to highlight. The next one I

I'm not trying to interrupt Chief, but you will have a chance to enter these as exhibits.

200 CHIEF: I will. 201 CHAIR: This is just your opening statement for now. 202 CHIEF: I want to make sure that when you get these, cause there's ten of them, that you 203 really read it. Because I want the decision to be made on her as a whole person 204 and not one bad decision. 205 CHAIR: Mr. Stephenson do you wish to make an opening statement? DIRECTOR: I do, thank you. Members of the Council, Addison Hejl gained employment with the 206 207 Lincoln Police Department of July 18, 2024. Upon application for basic law 208 enforcement training at the Lincoln Police Department Academy, a review of Ms. 209 Hejl's application was completed. A review of her personal character affidavit, page 210 3 found, Ms. Hejl disclosed use of illegal drugs or narcotics other than marijuana in 211 the five years preceding this application. On page 14 Ms. Hejl disclosed taking a 212 friends Adderall or unknown pill in April of 2023. Nebraska Rule and Regulation 213 Title 79, Chapter 8, section 004, requires applicants requesting admission into 214 certification or other mandated training programs at a training academy must meet 215 the qualifications specified below. Section 005.02(A)(6)(d) states has not illegally 216 used any dangerous drugs or narcotics other than marijuana for any purpose in the 217 last 5 years. The disclosures made by Ms. Hejl were in direct contradiction to the 218 Nebraska Rule and Regulations automatically disqualifying Ms. Hejl from basic law 219 enforcement training. Members of the Council, as part of my duties to ensure 220 individuals who apply law enforcement certification in the State of Nebraska meet 221 all statutory requirements as well as rules and regulations necessary for admission 222 and subsequent certification, I denied Ms. Hejl's application for admission into 223 basic law enforcement training. 224 CHAIR: Now is the time for further evidence that can be presented to the Council.

225	CHIEF:	Sorry for that.
226	CHAIR:	No, you're ok. This may include written evidence, witness testimony and or
227		unsworn statements by yourself or Ms. Hejl.

264		of this matter. Just the opportunity to appear is very much appreciated. I grew up in
265		a law enforcement family with my father serving for more than 30 years. So I have
2 6 6		the utmost respect for officers and for everyone who serves in this field. I truly
267		believe that I would make a great addition to the Lincoln Police Department and
268		hope that my one regrettable mistake does not hinder me from pursuing my
269		passion. It's no secret why I'm here today but I think it's extremely difficult to get to
270		know someone and to be able to truly judge their character solely by what you read
271		off of a piece of paper. I am hoping by me speaking today I am able to show you
272		guys who I, Addison Hejl, truly am as a person. I'm a recent graduate of Wayne
273		State College where I earned my bachelor's degree in social sciences. During my
274		time in Wayne I was inducted into six honor societies. Was either a member or

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held leadership positions in several clubs and organizations. Was a captain on the speech team and was also the student body president. I accomplished this while working four jobs my last year of school. Two in Wayne, one in Pender and one back home in Lincoln. The stress of classwork on top of jobs on top of extra curriculars on top of life became extremely overwhelming in April of 2023. The reason I'm speaking to you all today. It was the week before finals at Wayne and I was in the library with a friend where we were working on our final paper...(unintelligible)...However, that was just one of many tasks that I needed to accomplish. It was about 10 pm and the library closed at 1 and I had planned on staying there until the end just like I had every other night that week. But exhaustion was beginning to take over my body and I was using every ounce of motivation that I had. Two friends of mine spotted us tucked away and decided to join us. There the four of us were sharing our mutual complaints of classwork and studying and I was expressing the frustration I had due to lack of motivation. One of the girls who had joined us reached into her backpack and pulled out a zip lock bag that had a couple of pills in it. She told me that it was Adderall and it would help me focus. At the time I just knew that Adderall was a prescription for ADHD but nothing else about the pill. In the moment, in a moment of desperation I took the pill. I realized quickly that the consequences of it heavily outweighed the benefits and is still one of my biggest regrets. It does not reflect my true character as I have never been one to easily fold into peer pressure. I made it through both high school and college without once experimenting with marijuana which is something not a lot of people my age can say. That is more reflective of who I am as an individual. Some of these morals help guide their life. In the year to follow I regained a much lost faith and rejoined the Catholic church. Surrounding myself

300		with individual that I greatly look up to for their morals and ethics. People I strive to
301		be like. I truly believe, I am a truly different individual now then I was a year and
302		some odd change ago. It would be an honor to serve on the Lincoln Police
303		Department and I truly believe that this is my life's calling. I hope I'm not judged by
304		the mistakes of my past but rather who I am in the present and who I pray to be in
305		the future. Thank you.

316		I realized that wasn't for me and so I changed my major the week before my last
317		year and then I was trying to think of what I wanted to do in law enforcement. It
318		was always kind of something that's been in the back of mind, but I had also
319		always wanted to be a teacher, so I just decided to pursue that at first. And then it
320		was just kind of an aha moment because there was a law enforcement career fair
321		at Wayne, and I had talked with the Chief of Police at Seward, and I had a really
322		good conversation with him. I was like, why haven't I always been pursuing this.
323		So, I suppose it's always been in my mind but I officially decided I wanted to
324		pursue it in September of 2023.
