COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE

REGULAR MEETING OF THE POLICE STANDARDS ADVISORY COUNCIL June 18, 2025

I. CALL TO ORDER

Chairman, Chief Steve Reeves called the meeting to order at 9:03 A.M. Legal notice of the meeting was published in the Lincoln Journal Star on June 11, 2025. Roll call; Sgt. Drew Bolzer, Chief Paul Graham, Sheriff Greg London, Mr. Matthew McCarthy, Sheriff Dan Osmond, Chief Steve Reeves. Lt. Col. Jeff Roby, Asst. Chief Jason Stille and Deputy Chief Sherie Thomas were absent from the meeting.

II. APPROVAL OF MAY 21, 2025 P.S.A.C. MINUTES

Chief Reeves entertained a motion to approve the May 21, 2025 PSAC minutes.

MOTION

Chief Graham: I'll make a motion to approve the minutes. Sheriff Osmond seconded the motion.



III. REPORTS

A. Director's Report

Director Mark Stephenson reported on the following:

 Department of Education/VA Affairs: A representative conducted an audit. NLETC is signed up in a program that allows veterans to utilize their benefits while attending training. NLETC had not been audited since 2018. All of the documentation that was required was provided. It was clarified to the auditors that NLETC is not a community college, university or tech school. NLETC is still certified for the program.





- Job Task Analysis: NLETC has been working with DAS to obtain a contract for a new JTA. IO Solutions has been approached since they provide OPD with their entrance exam. IO Solutions would be able to develop a test based on the Job Task Analysis that any agency in the state could use during their hiring process. It would replace the TABE test for academy entrance.
- Management Program: There has been some discussion about the online portion of the management training. Due to the limited number of people enrolled in the online a number of extension requests come to the Council. Agency Counsel Sara Bockstadter is looking to streamline the course. There has also been discussion about creating a 3-day in-person class. The in-person class would allow the overflow who were unable to attend the online class to meet the requirements for training. It would also allow agency employees who are actually doing the work (i.e. tracking continuing education, helping the applicants complete the Chapter 8 application) to attend.
- Rule and Regulation Changes: The final draft with the changes is being prepared.

Sgt. Bolzer asked for clarification if the JTA test would be in place of the TABE test. Director Stephenson responded that the new JTA entrance test would be in place of the TABE test which would meet the requirements of having to read and write at an 11th grade level.

B. Deputy Director's Report

Deputy Director Gene Boner reported:

- 220th Basic Training Session: Started April 28th with 48 students. Currently 41 students are enrolled. With June 19th being a holiday no classes were scheduled for Thursday the 19th or Friday the 20th.
- New Instructor: Eric Javins will begin on July 7, 2025 as the DUI/SFST/Crash Investigations instructor. Eric spent 13 years with the Grand Island Police Department and the last 8 years with the Game & Parks Commission.
- The following training was held at NLETC:
 - Supervision: June 10-12, 2025 with 40 attendees.
- C. Nebraska State Patrol Training Academy (Crime Commission report was moved ahead of the NSP report.)

Sgt. Nick Plate reported on the following:

- Camp 71 graduated 7 recruits on June 13, 2025.
- Camp 72 will start on July 7, 2025 with 23 recruits.
- Completing the inservice training.
- The Training Academy trooper vacancy has been posted.
- The NSP Junior Law for both boys and girls will take place the week of June 23-25, 2025.

D. Crime Commission Report

Executive Director Bryan Tuma reported the following:

- LB-346: There was an attempt to sunset the racial profiling committee.
 The committee had not met since May 2021. The Crime Commission will look to fill the empty slots on the committee.
- LB-499: Crime Victim's Reparations Advisory Group added 5 additional members to the board.
- LB-150: Sponsored by the Attorney General's Office establishes the mental health expansion pilot project. The Crime Commission will be the project manager. Looking at a facility (possibly Antelope County) where a certain number of beds will be modified for inmates who need mental health services. It will require a federal grant.
- Budget: The upcoming bi-annual budget will be impacted by reduced revenue.
- Grants: SCIP (State Crisis Intervention Program) is a federal grant that has been received. NLETC will be receiving a new firearms simulator for use of force training. The simulator will be portable in order to use if for regional continuing education training.
- Grants: COPS- This grant would be for inservice and regional training opportunities primarily targeting rural law enforcement and how they interact with schools (school safety, school crisis response). The grant proposal was just submitted.

 National Criminal Justice Association: Federal grant funds are tied up until Congress passes the bill. 3.32 billion has been allocated to the Department of Justice to address a variety of needs. 2.055 billion has been allocated to the Department of Homeland Security for hiring additional border patrol agents and for state and local homeland security efforts.

Sheriff London asked about the bill that was going to decrease the number of continuing education hours. Executive Director Tuma responded that the bill died.

3	CHAIR:	This appeal hearing before the Police Standards Advisory Council in the
4		matter of Nebraska City Police Department v. Nebraska Law Enforcement
5		Training Center, Case Number 25-PSAC-104 is called to order. The date
6		is June 18, 2025 and the time is 9:23 a.m.
7	CHAIR:	The following members are present, Chief Paul Graham, Sgt. Drew
8		Bolzer, Dan Osmond, Sheriff Dan Osmond, Sheriff Greg London, Matthew
9		McCarthy, myself Chief Steve Reeves. Members not present; Asst. Chief
10		Jason Stille, Lt. Col. Jeff Roby and Deputy Chief Sherie Thomas. I'll note
11		that there's a quorum of the Council present, so this hearing may proceed.
12		Attorney Sara Bockstadter is here as legal advisor to the Council.
13	CHAIR:	The Council has been asked by the Petitioner, Nebraska City Police
14		Department, to consider reversing Director Stephenson's denial of
15		application for certification to its applicant, Brendan Whitted.
16	CHAIR:	The Council will hear this matter pursuant to its authority as stated in
17		Nebraska Revised Statutes 81-1403, its related statutes, and Title 79 of
18		the Nebraska Administrative Code.
19	CHAIR:	I will note that the Petitioner is present through Chief Murry and is not
20		represented by Counsel?
21	MURRY:	No sir.

22	CHAIR:	The petitioner's applicant, Brendan Whitted, is present. The Nebraska Law
23		Enforcement Training Center's Director, Mark Stephenson, is present and
24		not represented by counsel.
25	CHAIR:	Petitioners have the following rights in these proceedings; you have the
26		right to be heard, either in person or by counsel, who you have hired at
27		your own expense. Have you retained counsel in this matter?
28	CHAIR:	Previously answered as no. You have a right to notice, that is to receive a
29		statement from the State of Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center,
30		detailing or justifying its actions in this matter. You also have a right to
31		notice of the date, time, and location of the appeal hearing before the
32		Council. Additionally, you have a right to have this hearing, to present oral
33		arguments, submit written statements or exhibits, and provide testimony.
34		At the conclusion of the appeal hearing, the Council will consider what
35		was presented to the Council and will affirm, modify, or deny the decision
36		of the Director. The decision of the Council is final.
37	CHAIR:	Do you understand these rights?
38	WHITTED:	Yes sir.
39	CHAIR:	Did you receive notice from Director Stephenson stating the reasons for
40		the denial of Brendan Whitted's reciprocity application?
41	MURRY:	Yes.

45	CHAIR:	Did you notice any defects in either of those notices that prejudiced you

49	CHAIR:	The Police Standards Advisory Council shall act as the Hearing Board for
50		this appeal. Neither I, nor any other Council member, will be a witness for
51		either side and I am not aware of any matter, which I believe, may be
52		grounds for challenge by either side against me or the Council members.

54	BOLZER:	The defendant applied to our agency and I was supplied his employment
55		background.

70	CHAIR:	Mr. Stephenson, do you have any procedural documents for this case,
71		and if so, please present them to the Council.
72	DIRECTOR:	I do have two exhibits that I would ask to be accepted into evidence at this
73		time. Both are contained in a single binder. The first exhibit contains
74		documentation from the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center's file
75		for Mr. Whitted. All person identifying information has been redacted.
76		Those include; his change in status, application for training, employment
77		verification, character affidavit, authority to release. The second exhibit is
78		the denial packet to include; copies of the original denial letter, a letter
79		from Chief Murry requesting reconsideration, a copy of the final denial
80		letter, and a copy of the original letter from Chief Murry requesting the
81		appeal for PSAC on June 6th. I also have in this second one, the letters
82		supporting Mr. Whitted that Chief Murry submitted for his reconsideration
83		included in this folder.
84	CHAIR:	Exhibit 1 is a personal change in status form, two will be the application
85	GOBEL:	No, all together.
86	CHAIR:	All together?
87	GOBEL:	Yes.
88	DIRECTOR:	The second exhibit starts with the Exhibit 2 tab, which is the denial packet.
89	CHAIR:	Ok. Chief Murry and Mr. Whitted have you had the chance to review these
90		exhibits?

91	MURRY:	Yes sir.
92	WHITTED:	Yes sir.
93	CHAIR:	Chief Murry and Mr. Whitted do you have any objections to the receipt of
94		the exhibits into evidence?
95	MURRY:	No objections sir.
96	WHITTED:	No sir.
97	CHAIR:	Exhibits 1 and 2 are received.
98	CHAIR:	Does either side wish to address any further preliminary matters?
99	DIRECTOR:	: No sir
100	CHAIR:	Chief Murry or Mr. Whitted do you wish to make an opening statement?
101	MURRY:	Yes sir I would like to make an opening statement.
102	CHAIR:	Go ahead.
103	MURRY:	I am Chief Benjamin Murry of the Nebraska City Police Department.
104		Thank you for the opportunity to come before the Police Standards
105		Advisory Council this morning. We are requesting reconsideration to allow
106		Mr. Brendan Whitted to test for reciprocity to certify as a Nebraska law
107		enforcement officer. Mr. Whitted did not receive a letter in good standing
108		from the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department as required by
109		Nebraska standards. We did receive an email presenting three allegations
110		on three separate occasions. These allegations have been listed as the
111		first allegation occurred January 29, 2019, conduct unbecoming, failing to
112		properly exercise duties associated with rank, St. Louis Metropolitan
113		Police Department summary; "The involved employee, while working
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114 department approved overtime, conducted an occupied car check. The 115 involved employee released a subject they knew had a warrant, in 116 possession of a firearm." In speaking to Mr. Whitted, his response on this, 117 he explained the situation. There were four subjects in the vehicle with 118 warrants. One had a felony wanted. He did arrest the subject for the felony 119 wanted. This subject was related to a retired police captain, it was later 120 found out. The second subject that had a minor warrant that was in his 121 possession of a firearm, this subject was legal to own and be in 122 possession of a firearm. During FTO there had been several times that 123 officers did not arrest on minor warrants due to how busy they were during 124 their shift. He felt he had discretion to allow the subject to turn himself in 125 as occurred during FTO many times. Missouri State Statute has changed 126 to allow an affirmative defense now under Statute 575.10, 180, Failure to 127 execute an arrest warrant, offense and violation of penalties. Subsection 3 128 shows, it shall be an affirmative defense to prosecute under this section if 129 the law enforcement officer acted under exigent circumstances and failing 130 to execute an arrest warrant on a person who has committed a 131 misdemeanor offense under Chapters 301, 302, 304, 307 or a 132 misdemeanor traffic offense in another state. State of Missouri has 133 amended their statute to allow officer not to arrest on a warrant now based 134 off those sections. The second allegation, April 2019, a false reporting. 135 failure to follow evidence property procedures. St. Louis Metropolitan 136 Police Department summary; "The involved employee wrote false

137 information in the narrative section of a police report." No further details. Mr. Whitted's response; he had recovered a bullet fragment at a scene of 138 139 a property damage. He did not think the bullet fragment was involved with 140 the report he was taking. Stated in his report that the Sergeant was 141 advised. He did not get a chance to meet with the sergeant about it and did not enter the bullet fragment into evidence. Mr. Whitted stated that this 142 143 was a response that officers did when they would state the sergeant was 144 advised in their report that when they read their report that would they 145 were advised of that. The third allegation was April 2019, failure to 146 acknowledge and respond to radio call. The summary from St. Louis 147 Metro Police Department; "The involved employee failed to respond 148 directly to a Code 1 radio assignment." No further details. Mr. Whitted's 149 response advises that he does not even recall being brought in reference 150 failing to respond to a Code 1 call. He did state that it may have been to a 151 mix-up on his part. He stated that he was in the bathroom when a Code 2 152 call for a disturbance came out and a pursuit call came out at the same 153 time. The pursuit came by the station he was at, so he responded to that. 154 When he was made aware that he was assigned a code 2 that had now 155 become a code 1 (unintelligible) call, he left the pursuit call and responded 156 to the code 1 call. Mr. Whitted stated that he did not, was not even aware 157 of that because he had not been brought in for an IA investigation on this 158 incident. Brendan did come to Nebraska to attend Peru State College to 159 obtain the degree in Criminal Justice. Brendan did obtain a bachelor's

degree in 2013 in Criminal Justice. Brendan returned to St. Louis to follow his dream as a police officer. Brendan worked for St. Louis PD until going to St. Charles Police Department. We did receive a letter in good standing from St. Charles Police Department during the time that Brendan was there. Brendan returned to St. Louis PD as he found out that the grass isn't always greener on the other side. Brendan had to start his probationary time over again with St. Louis due to his departure to St. Charles. This is when Brendan obtained the three allegations against him. Brendan was with St. Louis PD, September 2016 to November 2017, Brendan did not receive any allegations or IA investigations during that time with St. Louis PD. Brendan started St. Charles PD November 2017 until March of 2018 when he returned to St. Louis PD where he was hired with a probationary period. Brendan began again with St. Louis PD around June 2018. Brendan went seven months with no allegations. Brenan moved back to Omaha area because he felt he had better opportunities in Nebraska. Brendan started with Nebraska City PD on April 2nd 2025. During that time I have been able to interact with Brendan as a person as well as an officer. Brendan has been nothing but open and honest about the mistakes he has made with St. Louis Metro Police Department. Brendan has been very humble and appreciative of the second chance. As he's stated on many occasions during our in-house training, to complete the training requirements that he does not want to be taught short cuts. He wants to do things the right was as a police officer. Short

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183 cuts is what he believes got him in trouble in St. Louis. We have presented 184 recommendation letters from two sergeants, two detectives, one lieutenant 185 and one officer FTO and one federal agent. Those were presented in the 186 packet from Director Stephenson. I would like to present some of the 187 statements from those. Sergeant Christopher Murray, no relation, stated 188 "that he had trained thirteen academy classes and trains hundreds of 189 recruits, I don't remember all of those I've trained but I certainly remember 190 Brendan. He was a joy to have around, and I suspect he will be a true 191 asset to law enforcement agencies. I would hire him." I have trouble 192 pronouncing his name and I apologize, Uzoma Onwumere, "I've had the 193 privilege of working closely with Brendan for three years in my capacity as 194 a St. Louis police officer prior to my departure to become a special agent 195 with the Federal Bureau of Investigation. One thing I noticed about him 196 right away was that he was a person of the utmost integrity. He 197 approached every situation with a clear moral compass. Brendan 198 consistently demonstrated honesty, fairness and respect for others. He 199 also listened attentively, spoke with clarity and de-escalated many tense 200 situations with ease. Usually through jokes or laughter, he consistently 201 took on an empathetic and diplomatic approach to dealing with citizens. 202 That made him a natural at building trust and positive relationships which 203 is a critical component for community policing. You may wonder why 204 someone with the skills I've mentioned was let go from our department 205 and is now looking to join your organization. During my time with the

department, there were a few sergeants who had specific ways they 206 207 wanted reports written. Specifically we wrote reports that contained a section where we would advise our sergeants of situations. We were 208 209 writing our police reports too. This practice of including a section like this 210 was standard procedure across the entire department. However, when Brendan wrote his own reports the same way the entire department had 211 212 written them for years, they accused him of false reporting and his 213 sergeant claimed he was never advised of the situations. Brendan was 214 involved in this incident coupled with being relatively new, under five years 215 experience, and the higher ups singled him out was why he left the 216 department. Unfortunately his case was not unique and a few other 217 promising patrol officers were let go for similar reasons." Detective Kim Hayes; "Brendan taught me valuable tactics in becoming a police officer. 218 219 In addition, his knowledge of police work is outstanding and his inspiration 220 to serve the community is unmatched. He is in the top 10% of good officers I've worked with in the past seven years." Brian Hayes, Field 221 Training Officer; "He is hard working, honest, and will go above and 222 beyond the call of duty. Brendan is always to learn, is always willing to 223 224 learn and is teachable. We need more police officers like Brendan and because he was an asset to this police force. I believe, due to certain 225 226 politics from within our police department caused Brendan's departure to be premature." Lieutenant Phillip Hodges; "I've had the privilege of 227 228 working alongside Mr. Whitted in Emmanuel Medical Center for a few

229	years. As he has helped to maintain positive position of integrity,
230	professionalism, and respect within our security department." Detective
231	Brandon Clark; "Unfortunately Mr. Whitted ran into some unforeseen
232	troubles that cost him. His time with our department I do believe Mr.
233	Whitted was not given a fair chance and some politics played a role and
234	did not allow him to prove himself as a young officer. The mistakes, I
235	believe, he made were teachable lessons. Although Mr. Whitted made
236	those mistakes I do believe he has learned from them, and this loss was
237	detrimental to our department more than his bright future." Sergeant Todd
238	Ross; "I did not hear of any issue or complaint from co-workers, citizens or
239	businesses. Also, however in this profession we all know it's easy to make
240	a minor mistake and it gets blown larger than it really is. Brendan had a
241	few minor issues I believe could have been resolved without termination,
242	forced resignation of Brendan. Those issues were teachable moments
243	every young officer will encounter. I do believe Brendan has grown and
244	has learned from his past and could once again be a valuable officer to
245	any police department wanting to give him another chance." We have
246	presented recommendations letters from two sergeants, two detectives,
247	one lieutenant and one officer FTO and one federal agent. We are before
248	you today to request that Brendan Whitted be allowed to complete
249	reciprocity testing to obtain a Nebraska law enforcement certification. I see
250	this as St. Louis Missouri's loss and Nebraska's gain to obtain, what I
251	believe, that one day will be one of the best officers to serve our

252 community within Nebraska City. I would like to present Brendan Whitted 253 for any questions or clarifications that I've gone over here at this time. 254 CHAIR: We'll circle back around in just a minute. Mr. Stephenson, do you wish to 255 make an opening statement? DIRECTOR: Yes sir I do. Members of the Council, Brendan Whitted was appointed as 256 257 a police officer for the Nebraska City Police Department on April 7th 2025 258 and has applied for the reciprocity certification course. I review Mr. 259 Whitted's application. The review consists of comparing the information 260 supplied by Mr. Whitted and his agency as well as additional background 261 information against the standards that are set forth in Nebraska 262 Administrative Law, Title 79, Chapter 8. The basis for the denial of Mr. 263 Whitted's application is found on the following grounds; Nebraska 264 Administrative Code, Title 79, Chapter 3, Section 004.03, states: "The 265 applicant will have all past law enforcement employers, agencies, submit a 266 written verification to the director regarding his or her dates of 267 employment, duty assignments, departmental agency, rank and 268 confirmation they left in good standing." On page 8 of the personal 269 character affidavit for the Nebraska Law Enforcement certification, 270 question 9; "Have you ever been terminated, suspended, disciplined or 271 permitted to resign in lieu of termination from any job?", Mr. Whitted 272 responded "yes". Mr. Whitted stated that he was terminated from the city 273 of St. Louis due to policy mistakes during probationary period. The 274 background investigation supplied by the Nebraska City Police

275		Department revealed and email from Sergeant Hodges of the internal
276		affairs division of the St. Louis Police Department outlining disciplinary
277		actions when they terminated, no re-hire classification which would not
278		indicate Mr. Whitted left in good standing. Mr. Whitted's ability to, inability
279		to obtain a letter of good standing from the previous law enforcement
280		employer was in conflict with Nebraska Administrative Code, Title 79,
281		Chapter 3, section 004.03. For this reason Mr. Whitted's application for the
282		basic reciprocity course was denied.
283	CHAIR:	Thank you. Now is the time further evidence may be presented to the
284		Council. This may include written evidence, witness testimony and/or
285		unsworn statements by yourselves. We will start with the Petitioners. Do
286		you have any written evidence for us to consider other than the items that
287		have been received which were the reference letters that you referred to
288		and then there's a copy of the statute that you referred to.
289	MURRY:	No further submissions sir.
290	CHAIR:	Chief Murray or Mr. Whitted, do you have any witnesses to testify?
291	WHITTED:	No sir.
292	CHAIR:	Chief Murry, you mentioned that Mr. Whitted may want to testify on his
293		own behalf?
294	MURRY:	He is available for any questions you may have or any clarification as to
295		what has been presented here today.
296	CHAIR:	Mr. Whitted, do you want to testify?
297	WHITTED:	Do you mind if I stand up?

298 CHAIR: No. Are you going to testify? 299 WHITTED: Yes. Ok. Can I get you to raise your right hand? Do you swear and affirm that 300 CHAIR: 301 the testimony you are about to make shall be the truth, the whole truth and 302 nothing but the truth? 303 WHITTED: Yes sir. 304 CHAIR: Go ahead. So before I give any statements or anything of that nature I'm a man of 305 WHITTED: 306 faith, so I give God the glory for just even having the opportunity to be 307 here again. To have a door closed and re-opened that you'd never thought 308 would be re-opened. I want to give a thanks to you guys for having me to 309 hear out my case today. It's been a long six years of being away from law 310 enforcement, something you have always wanted to do. I want to thank 311 Chief Murry personally for reaching out to me. A hundred days ago I was 312 on my way out, back to St. Louis thinking that the opportunity that I have 313 been wanting would not come true. But with Chief Murry reaching out to 314 me, hearing out my case, and giving me the opportunity to get to this point 315 I want to thank you. And I want to thank my parents, my support system, 316 that has always been there, would be right here with me if they could be 317 today that told me to not give up on my dream of being a police officer. I 318 believe that we all know that we have to the willpower to do this position 319 and it is a calling to do this position. I believe that is my calling to do, to be 320 a police officer. When I was a police officer six years ago I was a good

321		officer. I was hard working. A little overzealous but I was a good officer. I
322		want to assure you guys that if you have questions, anything that you
323		need to get more clarification, it will be nothing but the truth and honesty in
324		regards to what happened in my time in St. Louis Metropolitan Police
325		Department. Thank you.
326	CHAIR:	Mr. Stephenson, do you have any questions of this witness?
327	DIRECTOR	: No.
328	CHAIR:	Do any Council members have any questions for this witness?
329	LONDON:	Brendan, you started June of 2018.
330	WHITTED:	Yes sir.
331	LONDON:	Ok. How long did you work for them before they terminated you?
332	WHITTED:	About seven months.
333	LONDON:	Seven months.
334	WHITTED:	Yes sir.
335	LONDON:	On your termination letter did they list all three violations?
336	WHITTED:	I never received a termination letter.
337	LONDON:	Did you have a Loudermill meeting where you met with the chief?
338	WHITTED:	No sir.
339	LONDON:	They had to give you some documentation.
340	WHITTED:	I got sent down to Internal Affairs, then like I said, the third allegation I
341		wasn't even brought in for. So I got sent down to Internal Affairs for those
342		two and by the end of that second one I was terminated. This third one

343		was a shock to me when I applied to Nebraska City and they told me
344		about this case.
345	LONDON:	Which third one are you talking about?
346	WHITTED:	In regards to not responding to a Code 1.
347	LONDON:	Ok. They never gave you any documentation saying you're terminated?
348	WHITTED:	No sir.
349	LONDON:	Ok. Thank you.
350	CHAIR:	Did you have any kind of an interview? Were you allowed to present
351		evidence before your termination?
352	WHITTED:	I wasn't allowed to do anything. I had my union rep who was an attorney
353		literally talk to them and that was it. And he said they are letting you go.
354		They told me to come down with all my gear to headquarters to turn it in
355		and he said that they told him they were terminating me.
356	LONDON:	You were still on probation, right?
357	WHITTED:	Yes sir.
358	LONDON:	Ok, that's why you didn't have, ok I understand.
359	CHAIR:	So you hired on in June of 2018?
360	WHITTED:	Yes sir.
361	CHAIR:	And you were terminated or let go how many months in?
362	WHITTED:	I believe about seven months. It was March I believe.
363	CHAIR:	And what was your probationary period when you hired on?
364	WHITTED:	From June until June.
365	CHAIR:	Ok. 12 months. And then when did you go to St. Charles? That was next?

366	WHITTED:	That was prior to the June hire. I was with St. Louis city from September of
367		2016 to November of 2017. From November of 2017 to March or April of
368		2018 is where I was with St. Charles city and then I came back and due to
369		that hiring process it took a couple of months but came back June 2018.
370	GRAHAM:	When was your first incident that happened?
371	WHITTED:	Looks like it was January 2019.
372	GRAHAM:	They talked to you then?
373	WHITTED:	Yes.
374	GRAHAM:	And what did they tell you then? Did they give you corrective action they
375		tell you what you did wrong?
376	WHITTED:	No, they just sent me down to IAD and I explained what happened and
377		why I brought this individual in and why I let go of the other individual.
378		Once I said that, the case was closed and I went about my day and then
379		further weeks came, or a couple of days came, I don't really remember
380		which, I was sent down to IAD for another case.
381	GRAHAM:	It was a separate one?
382	WHITTED:	Yes. They were all pretty close together.
383	CHAIR:	So in January 2019, did they give you something at the conclusion of that?
384		Did you get the results?
385	WHITTED:	I have never received any type of paperwork from St. Louis Metropolitan
386		Police Department.
387	CHAIR:	And then you had, who did you meet with after the April 2019 incident?
388	WHITTED:	I met with IAD.

389	CHAIR:	Ok. And then nothing from the other, the very last one?
390	WHITTED:	No.
391	CHAIR:	You didn't even know about that until now?
392	WHITTED:	No.
393	McCARTHY	:When you came back to St. Louis the second time, were you on FTO for
394		any period of time?
395	WHITTED:	I believe they gave me a three month period.
396	McCARTHY	:Ok, so then you had completed that successfully?
397	WHITTED:	Yes sir.
398	McCARTHY	:And then you were completely on your own by the time you got called in to
399		IAD in January, is that right?
400	WHITTED:	Yes sir.
401	CHAIR:	Anything?
402	CHAIR:	Chief Murry and Mr. Whitted, do you have any additional evidence or
403		testimony you wish to present?
404	MURRY:	Yes sir. I would like to present that I did not receive any other
405		documentation from St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department other than
406		an email from the sergeant stating these three allegations. We did send
407		everything with the signed release for any information, and I did not
408		receive anything other than the three allegations.
409	CHAIR:	Chief Murry and Mr. Whitted have you concluded presenting your case?
410	WHITTED:	Yes sir.
411	MURRY:	Yes sir.

412	CHAIR:	Mr. Stephenson do you have any written evidence for us to consider?
413		Witness testimony or further statements?
414	DIRECTOR:	No. I'll save it for my closing.
415	CHAIR:	Any Council members have any questions for Mr. Stephenson?
416	LONDON:	Mark, did you have any other problems except for the failure that they
417		didn't give you a letter of recommendation?
418	DIRECTOR:	All of his application and all of his other paperwork is complete and ready
419		to go. This was the one thing that has prevented him from testing for the
420		reciprocity.
421	LONDON:	Ok. Bottom line, everything looks good except he didn't get a letter of
422		good standing. Ok. Thank you.
423	CHAIR:	Chief Murry or Mr. Whitted, in light of what was presented by Mr.
424		Stephenson, do you have any additional, anything additional to offer
425		before closing statements?
426	WHITTED:	No sir.
427	MURRY:	No sir.
428	CHAIR:	Chief Murry or Mr. Whitted, do you wish to make a closing statement?
429	MURRY:	Yes.
430	CHAIR:	Go ahead.
431	MURRY:	In closing I believe that we have presented today that Mr. Whitted was
432		caught up in a situation with St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department of
433		some political situations within the department. We hate to say that that
434		happens, but we know it does in departments across this nation. With the
		23

fact that I did not even receive anything from St. Louis Metropolitan Police
documentations to support any of this other than an email from the
sergeant. My concern is on this that anybody could send this out with this
information and present it if they have an axe to grind or a bone to pick
with somebody. There's no further documentation from St. Louis
Metropolitan Police Department that would allow me to go any further and
I've not been able to obtain any further information from them other than
this email for these allegations listed on there. As the allegations were
stated, they were one or two sentence allegations with no further
documentation to show beyond that. Any type of reprimand, any type of
corrective action that was taken with the St. Louis Metropolitan Police
Department. Mr. Whitted has presented everything when asked. He has
been open, upfront, and honest that he made mistakes. That he is the one
that did these things. Never once did he say that he didn't. These are
learning lessons I believe and the department, we've all started and had
these times in our career that we had situations that presented to us that
we may or may not have made the correct decision on. I believe for us as
law enforcement officers, how we learn from our mistakes is what creates
the experience that we have in the years to come. I appreciate your time
and opportunity to appear here.
Thank you. Mr. Stephenson do you wish to make a closing statement?

1	V. A.	Revocation Hearing-Terry Hughes (LR 215-21)
2	CHAIR:	This revocation hearing before the Police Standards Advisory Council in
3		the matter of State of Nebraska v. Terry Hughes, Case No. LR-215-21 is
4		called to order. The date is June 18, 2025 and the time is 10:15 a.m.
5	CHAIR:	The following Council members are present; Chief Paul Graham, Sgt.
6		Drew Bolzer, Sheriff Dan Osmond, Sheriff Greg London, Matthew
7		McCarthy and myself, Chief Steve Reeves. The following members are
8		not present; Asst. Chief Jason Stille, Lt. Col. Jeff Roby, Deputy Chief
9		Sherie Thomas. I will note that there is a quorum of the Council present,
10		so this hearing may proceed. Attorney Sara Bockstadter is here as a legal
11		advisor to the Council.
12	CHAIR:	The Council will hear this matter pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute
13		81-1403 and Title 79 of the Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 9,
14		Revocation of Law Enforcement Officer's Certification.
15	CHAIR:	In this case, the petitioner has filed a formal revocation complaint against
16		Terry J. Hughes the respondent officer. The allegations for revocation are
17		contained in the complaint filed by the State of Nebraska on April 29,
18		2025. An answer was received from the respondent and filed or about
19		May 22, 20225. I will note that on May 29, 2025 a Pre-Hearing Conference
20		was scheduled to be heard on June 9, 2025 at 9:00 a.m. to address
21		Respondent's request for a continuance incorporated within respondent's
22		answer. The Certificate of Service reflect that the order for the Pre-
23		Hearing Conference was sent by United States mail to the same physical
		20

24		address and email address respondent provided in his answer.
25		Respondent failed to appear at the Pre-Hearing Conference on June 9,
26		2025. Respondent's request for a continuance was denied during the Pre-
27		Hearing Conference and the formal revocation hearing was ordered to
28		commence on June 18, 2025 at approximately 9:10 a.m. as previously
29		scheduled. The Certificate of Service reflects that the Journal Entry and
30		Order from the Pre-Hearing Conference was mailed to the respondent at
31		the same physical address and email address respondent provided in his
32		answer. I will note that this is the same address in which personal service
33		was provided to Mr. Hughes.
34	CHAIR:	Special Assistant Attorney Jonathan Hendricks appears today on behalf of
35		the State. I will note that Terry Hughes is not present nor is counsel
36		present representing him.
37	CHAIR:	The Police Standards Advisory Council shall act as the Hearing Board for
38		this appeal. Neither I, nor any other Council member, will be a witness for
39		either side and I am not aware of any matter, which I believe, may be
40		grounds for challenge by either side against me or the Council members.
41	CHAIR:	Does any Council member have any personal knowledge of this case. (All
42		members responded no.)
43	CHAIR:	Does either side have any further questions or challenge for cause against
44		any member of the Council?
45	JON:	No.
46	CHAIR:	Are the parties ready to proceed with this case?

47	JON:	Yes.
48	CHAIR:	Mr. Hendricks may proceed with an opening statement at this time.
49	JON:	Thank you Mr. Chairperson. Jon Hendricks, Special Assistant Attorney
50		General. I'm here this morning to request the Council recommend the
51		revocation of the law enforcement certification of Terry J. Hughes. After
52		the presentation of evidence I believe you'll be able to do so under the
53		authority set forth in Nebraska Revised Statute 81-1403, subsection
54		6(a)(iii), due to a misdemeanor violation of state or federal law if the
55		violation has a rational connection with officer's fitness or capacity to serve
56		as a law enforcement officer. Also, Nebraska Revised Statute 81-1403,
57		subsection 6(c) a violation of Mr. Hughes' Nebraska Law Enforcement
58		Officer oath of office, code of ethics and statutory duties. Thank you.
59	CHAIR:	Mr. Hendricks you may proceed with your case. Do you have any exhibits
60		or testimony to offer at this time?
61	JON:	I do. I have exhibits. May I approach?
62	CHAIR:	Yes.
63	JON:	I offer Exhibit 1, which is a copy of the original complaint. It has sub-
64		exhibits 1A-1F which were attached to the original complaint. I would offer
65		Exhibit 2, which is a letter dated May 2, 2025 notifying Mr. Hughes of
66		today's hearing. I would offer Exhibit 3, which is a return of service
07		
67		showing Mr. Hughes was served with Exhibit 2 on May 9, 2025 notifying
68		showing Mr. Hughes was served with Exhibit 2 on May 9, 2025 notifying him of today's hearing. I would offer Exhibit 4, which is the police reports

70		2021 that Mr. Hughes was involved in and later convicted of an offense
71		related to this investigation. I would offer Exhibit 5, which is the summary
72		of the internal affairs investigation regarding Mr. Hughes. I would offer
73		Exhibit 6, which is the investigator report of Dennis Leonard regarding Mr.
74		Hughes. Exhibit 7 was marked but I decided not to offer that so I will just
75		skip to Exhibit 8, which was a copy of the order for the pre-hearing
76		conference that was set for June 9th. As discussed, Mr. Hughes had
77		requested a continuance in his answer. This hearing was set up for Mr.
78		Hughes. He was provided notice by mail and email and then did not
79		appear at the pre-hearing conference. The notice of that pre-hearing
80		conference is marked as Exhibit 8 and then the journal entry reflecting that
81		Mr. Hughes did not appear at that conference is Exhibit 9.
82	CHAIR:	Exhibit 1, 1A through 1F, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, and 9 are received. Mr. Hendricks
83		does the State have any witnesses to testify?
84	JON:	No Mr. Chairperson.
85	CHAIR:	Do you have any other further evidence?
86	JON:	No.
87	CHAIR:	Has the State concluded presenting its case?
88	JON:	Yes.
89	CHAIR:	Mr. Hendricks you may proceed with your closing.
90	JON:	Thank you. Again I would request the Council recommend the revocation
91		of the Law Enforcement Certification of Terry J. Hughes. Mr. Hughes
92		received his law enforcement certification in 2003. He was employed at

115

the Omaha Police Department from September 2002 to December 2022. Mr. Hughes was charged on July 6th in the Douglas County Court with 2 offenses of terroristic threats and 1 count of use of a firearm to commit a felony. All felony charges relating to a criminal investigation of events occurring on July 2, 2021. According to the police reports which have been marked and received as Exhibit 4, on July 2, 2021 law enforcement responded to a residence in Omaha and made contact with a female resident, Ms. Q. The resident explained that she and Mr. Hughes had been in a relationship prior, however, had ended their relationship. According to Ms. Q, on this evening in the early morning hours, Mr. Hughes arrived at her residence uninvited while still in his police uniform. and let himself into the residence. Mr. Hughes then made his way to her bedroom and began pounding on the door. When Mr. Hughes found that Ms. Q was present with another male in her bedroom Mr. Hughes became upset and began to ransack the residence, tipping over a dresser, then going to the kitchen and tipping over a freezer and a coffee table. Officers were able to observe this damage at the scene. It was further reported by the male that was present, Ms. Q and a third male, who was a brother of Ms. Q, that at one point Mr. Hughes had unholstered his service weapon. While he did not point it directly at anyone in particular, began to make threats while holding a weapon that he should shoot people. It was further stated that, by the male and Ms. Q that at one point Mr. Hughes either dropped or set down his service weapon during this event and had left the

residence and then realized that he had left his service weapon there and 116 117 returned. The male handed the service weapon back to Mr. Hughes. Mr. Hughes again threatened him saying; "I should shoot your ass", while 118 holding the firearm in his hand. Mr. Hughes retired from the Omaha Police 119 120 Department on December 6, 2022. On January 4, 2023 an amended complaint was filed in Mr. Hughes' Douglas County Criminal case, 121 122 charging him now with two counts of attempted criminal mischief over 123 \$5000.00, both Class 1 Misdemeanors. Mr. Hughes pled no contest to 124 those charges and was convicted of the amended charges. He was sentenced to a year of probation. The court records of those offenses are 125 provided in Exhibit 1C. An informal complaint was received on January 9. 126 2023. Mr. Hughes was notified of that informal complaint by a letter from 127 the Executive Director dated February 1, 2023. On November 26, 2024 128 129 Mr. Hughes was notified by certified mail of the Executive Director's decision to request formal revocation of his law enforcement certificate. 130 Mr. Hughes was personally served with notice of today's hearing on May 131 9, 2025 which was provided in Exhibit 3. I would ask that the Council 132 recommend the revocation of Mr. Hughes' law enforcement officer 133 134 certification on the authority found in Nebraska Revised Statute 81-1403, subsection 6(a)(iii), which was a misdemeanor violation of State or 135 Federal law, if the violation has a rational connection with the officer's 136 fitness or capacity to serve as a law enforcement officer on the basis that 137 this occurred while Mr. Hughes was in uniform, his service weapon was 138

139		involved and was reportedly used to make threats. Also under Nebraska
140		Revised Statute 81-1403 (6)(c) which was a violation of Mr. Hughes' law
141		enforcement code of ethics, which required that you obey the criminal
142		laws of the city, county, state and federal government. Thank you.
