# REGULAR MEETING OF THE POLICE STANDARDS ADVISORY COUNCIL June 21, 2023

# I. CALL TO ORDER

Chairman, Assistant Chief Brian Jackson called the meeting to order at 9:00 A.M. Legal notice of the meeting was published in the Lincoln Journal Star on June 14, 2023. Roll call; Asst. Chief Brian Jackson, Lt. Col. Buck Duis, Chief Deputy Greg London, Sheriff Dan Osmond, Deputy Chief Sherie Thomas, Chief Wolf.

Absent from call to order were Sgt. Drew Bolzer and Mr. Matt McCarthy.

# 2. APPROVAL OF May 17, 2023 P.S.A.C. MINUTES

# MOTION

Sheriff Osmond motioned to approve the minutes of the May 17, 2023 meeting with the references to "Chief" Osmond being changed to "Sheriff" Osmond. Chief Deputy London seconded the motion.

Voting in favor; Lt. Col. Duis, Chief Deputy London, Sheriff Osmond, Deputy Chief Thomas, Chief Wolf, Asst. Chief Jackson. Motion carried.

# REPORTS

#### A. Director-N.L.E.T.C.

Interim Director Stephenson reported that former Director Urbanek would be attending the 214<sup>th</sup> Basic Graduation on August 18, 2023 at 11:00 a.m. Reciprocity testing was held May 30, 2023 with two applicants. Both applicants passed the written test and completed the physical skills test.

# B. Deputy Director of Training-N.L.E.T.C.

Interim Director Stephenson reported that the 214<sup>th</sup> currently has 46 enrolled. NLETC conducted or coordinated the courses listed below:

# C. Nebraska State Patrol Training Academy

Capt. Ecklund reported that Camp 67 graduated June 16, 2023 with 12 troopers. Camp 68 will begin July 5, 2023 with 11 attending. Inservice was wrapped up on June 8, 2023.

# D. Crime Commission Report

Bryan Tuma reported that he was appointed to the Executive Director of the Crime Commission and was looking forward to working with the Council and the law enforcement community.

Executive Director Tuma stated that there are currently a lot of challenges to policing and there is an opportunity to take a look at the policing profession and how the Crime Commission can support them. Governor Pillen has been extremely supportive of law enforcement.

# Updates:

Filling the NLETC Director's position: A draft of the posting was reviewed by Dr. Arp who made some changes to the educational requirements for the position. The position identified Master's Degree preferred, with Bachelor's Degree required. Dr. Arp recommended that equivalent experience be considered if there was no degree. Executive Director Tuma will confer next week to address that posting and the other openings at the Crime Commission.

Expansion Project: There will be a meeting on June 28, 2023 at NLETC.

Revocations: Executive Director Tuma has been learning the history of the active investigations and the process of revocations.

Organization Structure of the Crime Commission: Will be making some changes as the new director. Focus will be on supporting the training center and PSAC.

Crime Victims Reparations: The Governor has made some appointments to the CVR board and are reviewing the processes for possible changes.

#### 4. Old Business

# A. Police Service Dog Program Review

Interim Director Stephenson reported that Mr. Kerby has begun a reconciliation of records on file at NLETC. Mr. Kerby was able to reconcile the records and resolved some anomalies that he found with what is allegedly out there to what we actually have. Mr. Kerby was invited to observe the Lincoln Police Departments PSD training session on June 22<sup>nd</sup>. Mr. Kerby has sent an email invitation to any agency or academy who conducts PSD training to make himself available to either answer their questions or observe the training. There is a meeting scheduled for June 29<sup>th</sup> for any PSD Judges who are available at NLETC. The meeting is to begin evaluating current standards vs. practice and certifications. Mr. Kerby will report his findings to the Council.

# B. Open seat on the Police Standards Advisory Council

Executive Director Tuma reported that he is working with the Governor's office regarding appointments. The filibuster at the last legislative session created a backlog of appointments that they were unable to have confirmation hearings. A list of vacancies requiring the Governor's appointments has been sent to the Governor's office.

# C. L.E.A.R. Program Update

Jessica Wagoner reported that NLETC has been processing applications for 35 days. 1,265 applications have been approved and denied 984. The denials are mostly paperwork issues with some that the officers have a break in service. The total dollar amount is almost 1.3 million. Jessica Wagoner reported on the steps of the process. Changes have been constantly made to make the application process easier including a step-by-step video that is online for officer to view. Asst. Chief Jackson asked how many were eligible for the payment. Jessica Wagoner estimated that there were 4,200. Mr. Stolz reported that they had started to field questions on tax issues. There would be no taxes withheld at the time of payment and there was nothing in the program that stated that the payment would be tax exempt or deferred. Mr. Stolz reached out to the Dept. of Revenue to clarify. It was his understanding that it would be taxable income.

Asst. Chief asked about the status of Title 79 Chapters 8 and 10. Mr. Stolz reported that 10 made it through PRO with no changes so it will go to the Commission for a vote and if approved it will go the Attorney General's office for review. Chapter 8 is still at the Governor's office.

# 5. **New Business** 2 Appeal Director's Denial to Attend Reactivation Α. Brandon Shimmin, North Platte Police Department 3 Chair: The matter now before the Police Standards Advisory Council is Nebraska North 4 5 Platte Police Department on behalf of its applicant, Brandon Shimmin, v. the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center, Case Number 23 PSAC 93. 6 I will now call this hearing in order at 0922 hours. I will note the following Council 8 members are present: Myself, Assistant Chief Brian Jackson, Lincoln Police Department 9 10 Sheriff Dan Osmond, Custer County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Greg London, Sarpy County Sheriff's Office 11 Lt. Colonel Buck Duis, Nebraska State Patrol 12 Chief Tracy Wolf, Lexington Police Department and 13 Deputy Chief Sherie Thomas, Omaha Police Department. 14 15 Chair: The Council has been asked by the petitioner, North Platte Police Department, to consider reversing Director Urbanek's denial of Mr. Shimmin's entrance into the 16 Basic Law Enforcement Officer Certification Course. 17 Chair: The Council is here pursuant to its authority as stated in Nebraska Revised 18 Statute §81-1403, its related statutes and Title 79 of the Nebraska Administrative 19 20 Code. I will note that the petitioner, Chief Steven Reeves is present along with the Chair: 21 petitioner's applicant Brandon Shimmin. Are you represented by counsel? 22 No we are not. 23 Reeves:

24	Chair:	The Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center's Interim Director Mark
25		Stephenson is present and will present the case on behalf of NLETC. Is there an

27	Stephenson:	No.
28	Chair:	Does either party contest the Council's authority to hear this type of case?
29	Reeves:	No.
30	Stephenson:	No.
31	Chair:	Title 79 of the Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 8, specifies the
32		requirements that must be met by an applicant in order to be eligible for the Basic
33		Law Enforcement Officer Certification Course.

35	Chair:	Pursuant to Title 79, Chapter 8, section 009.02, upon request of an applicant or
36		agency, the Council will conduct a hearing in order to determine whether the
37		applicant meets the minimum qualification for admission into a certification
38		course. The burden during the appeal hearing is on the applicant to demonstrate
39		by clear and convincing evidence that he or she meets admission qualifications.
40		
41		Per Title 79, Chapter 13, section 004.02(g), the issues of this appeal will be
42		limited to those raised in the request for review and reconsideration as provided
43		in section 004.02(c) and the director's written decision in response.
44	Chair:	The decision of this Council is final.
45	Chair:	Chief Reeves, I want to go over your rights in this Administrative Hearing.
46	Chair:	You have the right to be heard, either in person or by counsel who you have
47		hired at your own expense. You have the right to notice; that is to receive a

48		statement from the State, the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center,
49		detailing or justifying its actions in this matter.
50	Chair:	Do you understand these rights?
51	Reeves:	Yes.
52	Chair:	Did you receive such notice via letters from Director Urbanek stating her reasons
53		for her denial of your basic application?
54	Reeves:	I did.
55	Chair:	Did you notice any defects in those letters that prejudiced you from presenting
56		your case?
57	Reeves:	No.
58	Chair:	Additionally, you have the right to present evidence at this hearing, a right to the
59		Council's finding and a right to seek judicial review thereafter. Do you understand
60		these rights?
61	Reeves:	Yes.
62	Chair:	The Police Standards Advisory Council shall act as the Hearing Board for this
63		appeal. Neither I, nor any Council member, will be a witness for either side and I
64		am not aware of any matter which I believe may be grounds for challenge by
65		either side against me or the other Council members.
66		As it pertains to your appeal of the director's decision to deny your applicant
67		entrance into the basic officer certification course, I have not had any personal
68		information conveyed to me nor do I have any personal knowledge of this case.

116		addressing, it was a lengthy way of saying felony when it turned out it was a
117		lengthy way of saying Class 1 Misdemeanor so we had a misunderstanding. We
118		brought him on board and led us to this process. It was never our intent to bring
119		him on board and exercise this process.
120	Chair:	Ok. Director Stephenson, do you wish to make an opening statement?
121	Stephenson:	I would. Members of the Council Brandon Shimmin is currently employed with the

program. Director Urbanek of the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center review Mr. Shimmin's application. The review consisted of comparing the information supplied by Mr. Shimmin and his agency as well as additional background information against the standards set forth in Nebraska Administrative Law Title 79, Chapter 8. The basis for Director Urbanek's initial denial of Mr. Shimmin's application was founded on the grounds in Nebraska Administrative Code Title 79, Chapter 8, Section 005.01(f), provides that individuals with an unpardoned conviction for crimes that would be punishable by imprisonment for a term of 1 year or more not be eligible for admission. Mr. Shimmin had made previous application to the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center to attend a basic training in 2014. Where his conviction of a Class 1 Misdemeanor went through the admission process undiscovered. Mr. Shimmin completed his basic training and was certified in 2014 and Mr. Shimmin worked as a law enforcement officer in the State of Nebraska until 2018 when he resigned. Upon applying for the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center's Reactivation program in April 2023, Director Urbanek reviewed Mr. Shimmin's application and found a Class 1 Misdemeanor conviction which occurred in 2005, Upon confirmation of this information Chief Reeves was notified of the finding and that Mr. Shimmin would be denied admission into the Reactivation program. He advised Director Urbanek that he would send a letter per Title 79 Chapter 8 for additional review. Following Title 79 Chapter 13, Chief Reeves appealed the initial denial of Mr. Shimmin's application. Director Urbanek reviewed the information supplied and found that no mitigating or new information was provided to overturn her original denial.

157		sentence. We did the background, other than a traffic offense, maybe two, found
158		nothing in his criminal backgrounds after the 2005 arrest for the DUI and
159		subsequent conviction so we brought him on board. We found him to be a good
160		fit at our department. He's a little older, good with people and we would like to
161		keep him around.
162	Chair:	Director Stephenson, do you have any written evidence for us to consider?
163	Stephenson:	No.
164	Chair:	Director Stephenson, do you have any witnesses to testify?
165	Stephenson:	No.

172	Reeves:	At the time of this conviction, Mr. Shimmin was 27 years old. He's been through a
173		career in the Army Reserve. He's retiring and is working a civilian job that
174		required him to be an active member of the Army Reserve. He has served in the
175		Reserves for 21 years and he is retiring from that civilian job. Wanted to get back
176		into law enforcement. Applied at North Platte and we hired him. From his
177		conviction at age 27, he's now 44 years old, he is married, he's raised seven
178		children. We found his character to be good. We found his background to be
179		good. After the 2005 arrest, we brought him onboard again, not intending to go
180		through this process, but we certainly want to keep him employed.
181	Chair:	Did Mr. Shimmin wish to address the Council.
182	Shimmin:	I do not sir.
183	Chair:	Director Stephenson, you may make a closing argument at this time.
184	Stephenson:	Mr. Shimmin was certified as a law enforcement officer despite having a Class 1
185		Misdemeanor that was not discovered at the time of his initial certification. His
186		past law enforcement work was not adversely impacted by his conviction.
187		However, he still has to meet the certification requirements in order to obtain
188		active status again. In an effort of transparency, the Class 1 Misdemeanor
189		conviction needs to be addressed by this body in order to follow the admission
190		requirements as set out by Title 79. I would submit this matter to Council so the
191		record is clear for both Mr. Shimmin and his agency.

125		provides that individuals with an unpardoned conviction for crimes that would be

126		punishable by imprisonment for a term of 1 year more, are not eligible for
127		admission. Number two, Mr. Carson was also denied admission on Title 79,
128		Chapter 8, 005.04(a)(2), which states any deliberate omission, falsification and/or
129		misrepresentation made on the application or through the application process
130		including the background investigation are grounds for denial of entrance into the
131		Training Academy. Mr. Carson had initially been conditionally accepted to the
132		214 <sup>th</sup> Basic class on May 1 <sup>st</sup> 2023. On April 18 <sup>th</sup> 2023 the Nebraska Law
133		Enforcement Training Center received a fingerprint report on Mr. Carson which
134		identified a conviction of a Class 1 Misdemeanor for procuring alcohol for a minor
135		in 2007. A follow-up NCJIS check confirmed the conviction and classification as a
136		Class 1 Misdemeanor. Upon confirmation of said information, Chief Investigator
137		Hughson was notified of the finding, that Mr. Carson would be denied admission
138		into the 214 <sup>th</sup> Basic class. He advised Director Urbanekhe was advised that
139		Director Urbanek would send a letter that would include Title 79, Chapter 13 for
140		his review. Following Title 79, Chapter 13, Mr. Carson appealed Director
141		Urbanek's initial denial of his application. Director Urbanek reviewed this
