# REGULAR MEETING OF THE POLICE STANDARDS ADVISORY COUNCIL April 17, 2024

## I. CALL TO ORDER

Vice-Chairman, Chief Steve Reeves called the meeting to order at 9:00 A.M. Legal notice of the meeting was published in the Lincoln Journal Star on April 10, 2024. Roll call; Lt. Col. Buck Duis, Chief Paul Graham, Asst. Chief Brian Jackson, Mr. Matt McCarthy, Sheriff Dan Osmond, Chief Steve Reeves, Deputy Chief Sherie Thomas. Sgt. Drew Bolzer and Chief Deputy Greg London were absent.

## II. APPROVAL OF MARCH 20, 2024 P.S.A.C. MINUTES

Chief Reeves asked if there was a motion to approve the March 20, 2024 minutes.

## MOTION

Asst. Chief Jackson: I'll make a motion to approve the March 20, 2024 PSAC minutes. Chief Graham seconded the motion.

Voting in favor: Lt. Col. Duis, Chief Graham, Asst. Chief Jackson, Mr. McCarthy, Sheriff Osmond, Chief Reeves, Deputy Chief Thomas. Motion approved.

#### III. REPORTS

## A. Director's Report

Director Mark Stephenson reported on the following:

- The 217<sup>th</sup> Basic class received 63 eligible applications by the due date. The first 7 enrolled were deferred from the 216<sup>th</sup> Basic. There were 55 approved applications. The 218<sup>th</sup> Basic class will already start with 9 students who were deferred from the 217<sup>th</sup>.
- The continuing education audit is complete. There were some issues with officers who work full time at one agency and part time at another. The part time agency was chosen for the audit and there was difficulty in getting the required documentation for the audit. The officers were not approximately approxi

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1 04/17/2024 PSAC replying to any communication from NLETC. NLETC contacted the full time agency to let them know their officer would be facing suspension for not completing the audit. That opened up the line of communication quickly. 30 agencies were contacted for the audit. 2 of the agencies had disbanded. 68 officers were audited. 61 completed the audit. 4 officers submitted change in status forms that removed them from the audited agency. 3 officers were suspended.

Director Stephenson attended the IADLEST conference on April 8-9<sup>th</sup>.
 Hiring, retention and Academy trends were big topics discussed at the conference.

# B. Deputy Director's Report

Deputy Director Gene Boner reported on the following:

- The 216<sup>th</sup> Basic training class graduated on April 12<sup>th</sup> with 45 students. The class started on January 2<sup>nd</sup> with 50 students. 1 student was removed for disciplinary issues and the other 4 were due to test failures. There will be 1 student recycling for the Firearms portion of the training during the 217<sup>th</sup> Basic.
- The annual Highway Safety grant has been approved. The grant covers a portion of salaries for instructors who teach the related classes, and it also pays to host the advanced crash investigation training.
- Intermediate Crash Investigation course was held March 25-29, 2024 with 19 students enrolled.
- Firearms Instructor Recertification course was held April 3, 2024 with 14 students enrolled.
- Patrol Rifle Instructor Recertification course was held April 4, 2024 with 10 students enrolled.
- Deputy Director Boner introduced the 2 new instructors. Jesse Parker is the new Defensive Tactics instructor and Chris Anderson is the new SFST coordinator instructor.

# C. Nebraska State Patrol Training Academy

Captain Andy Ecklund reported on the following:

- Basic Recruit Camp 69 is in week 15. 13 recruits are enrolled.
- Current, past, and upcoming courses for the recruits were reported on.

# D. Crime Commission Report

Executive Director Bryan Tuma reported on the following:

- May 11-18, 2024 will be National Peace Officer week in Washington D.C.
   There might be the opportunity to recruit some officers to Nebraska.
- Cody Thomas from the Nebraska State Patrol was contacted to help draft
  a generic recruitment message for Nebraska Law Enforcement. The
  Crime Commission is willing to cover the cost of a mobile billboard. A
  strategic time during that week would be decided on that wouldn't conflict
  with the Law Enforcement Memorial week.
- The probation offender data has been restored to the NCJIS platform.
- The Crime Commission meeting is scheduled for May 17, 2024.
- The Law Enforcement Memorial even is also scheduled for May 17, 2024 in Grand Island.
- LB-388: There was mention in the bill regarding a "strength of force" formula being developed by the Crime Commission that would be used by municipalities, local law enforcement, and local government to determine their staffing of law enforcement officers. There is not much information at this time. The creation of the formula would be a collaborative undertaking between the Crime Commission, PSAC and the State Auditors.
- There is speculation that a special session of the Legislature will be called on tax issues. No definite plan has come from the Governor's office at this time.

## E. Basic Police Academy/Academy Staffing Discussion

Chief Kevin Denney of the Grand Island Police Department appeared before the Council to discuss his inability to get all of his agencies needed officers into the academy. With a class limit of 50 students in the academy, it presents a situation where the agency can't expand or even maintain the level of officers needed. There is currently a logjam. Chief Denney suggested a short term solution of contracting more instructors in order to have more people enrolled into a basic class. Chief Denney also suggested a needs assessment of all agencies to help determine the staffing needs of agencies and what short and long term solutions are available.

Director Stephenson reported on the number of students enrolled in the last 5 years. Director Stephenson also reported that the current curriculum was built around the current staff of 7 instructors for a maximum of 50 students.

Deputy Director Boner reiterated that there are currently not enough resources to increase the enrollment numbers. If the enrollment numbers are increased there would need to be an adjustment on the duration of the basic in order to get everyone through the skills portion of the training.

Director Stephenson was asked to explain the applicant screening process and how the priority list is chosen for the basic classes.

After much discussion the Council recommended creating a working group to explore the options and potential solutions to the enrollment issues.

5		Enforcement Training Center, Case number 24 PSAC 99.
6	CHAIR:	I will now call the meeting to order at 10:25 a.m. I will note the following Council
7		members are present: Myself, Chief Reeves, Lt. Col. Duis, Chief Graham, Asst.
8		Chief Jackson, Sheriff Osmond, Mr. McCarthy, and Deputy Chief Thomas.
9	CHAIR:	The Council has been asked by the Petitioner, Dixon County Sheriff's Office to
10		consider reversing Director Stephenson's denial of Mr. Bell's entrance into the
11		Basic Law Enforcement Officer Certification Course.
12	CHAIR:	The Council is here pursuant to its authority as stated in Nebraska Revised Statute
13		§81-1403, its related statutes and Title 79 of the Nebraska Administrative Code.
14	CHAIR:	I will note that the petitioner, Sheriff Thomas Decker is present along with the
15		petitioner's applicant Dayton Bell.
16	CHAIR:	Sheriff Decker, are you represented by counsel?
17	SHERIFF:	No.
18	CHAIR:	Mr. Bell, are you represented by counsel?
19	BELL:	No sir.
20	CHAIR:	Sheriff Decker, since Dixon County has appealed the director's decision, I will
21		direct the rest of the proceedings to you. However, since Mr. Bell hasn't, has not
22		had an attorney present we'll allow him to speak on his behalf at the end of these
23		proceedings.

24	CHAIR:	The Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center's Director Mark Stephenson is
25		present and will present the case on behalf of the Nebraska Law Enforcement

40		The burden during this appeal hearing is on the applicant to demonstrate by clear
41		and convincing evidence that he meets admission qualifications.

104	DIRECTOR:	They are separated this time in 1 and 2.
105	CHAIR:	Sheriff Decker, do you have any objection to the receipt of these exhibits?
106	SHERIFF:	No.
107	CHAIR:	Let the record reflect that Exhibits 1 and 2 have been received and are entered into
108		the record. Does either side which to address any further preliminary matters?
109	SHERIFF:	No.
110	DIRECTOR:	No.
111	CHAIR:	Sheriff Decker, as the petitioner, you may make an opening statement at this time.
112	SHERIFF:	My name is Tom Decker. I am the Sheriff at Dixon County. I want to than the Police
113		Standards Advisory Council for having us today. For taking the time to hear this
114		case. This case comes back that Dayton was honest on his applicant. When Rich
115		Lamprecht did the triple I nothing came back so we looked a little bit farther into it.
116		It was from a fight when he was 21 years old. On his 21st birthday, 18 plus years
117		ago, at a bar in Wayne at Riley's. So while we're looking at it, the Chief Deputy
118		called over to Chief Marlin Chinn from Wayne Police Department and received the
119		statement, the police report. So I then talked to the County Attorney, it's Amy Miller
120		now, she wasn't there at the time, so they don't have anything on record. So I went
121		to the County Courts, they don't have anything on record. They purged everything.
122		So I think the standard is 15 years and they go and purge everything. So I don't
123		have a whole lot to go off of. We have what Marlin Chinn said is that Dayton paid a

124 \$150 dollar fine for the fight. When I have time to present everything in my folder I 125 will, you will kind of see, I'll kind of go through, the night of the bar fight, it wasn't 126 really a bar fight. He was 21 years old and had too much to drink and the bouncers 127 were going to take him out. The police department, the police officer, Ed Foote, drove by seeing there was a scuffle out front of the establishment. The bartenders 128 129 nor the bouncers or security officer called 911. I think it was going to be handled 130 outside by them. Luckily Ed Foote drove by, stopped and detained and got the information. So, again it was all brought forward by Dayton, you know, I mean, so, 131 132 he's kind of changed his life around from 18 years ago. He joined the military. He 133 stuck around and was honorably discharged. He stuck around the area. Worked for 134 a couple of different businesses. Seemed like he was in good standing with those 135 companies. So, his (unintelligible) reinstatement I guess. So thank you very much. 136 Thank you. Director Stephenson do you wish to make an opening statement? CHAIR: 137 DIRECTOR: Yes sir. Members of the Council, Dayton Bell is currently employed with the Dixon 138 County Sheriff's Office and has applied for the NLETC Basic Police Academy in the 217th class. I reviewed Mr. Bell's application packet. The review consisted of 139 140 comparing the information supplied by Mr. Bell and his agency as well as additional 141 background information against the standards set forth in Nebraska Administrative 142 Law Title 79, Chapter 8. The basis for denial of Mr. Bell's application is founded on 143 the following grounds; Nebraska Administrative Code Title 79, Chapter 8 section 144 005.01F states, the applicant has never been convicted by a state, the United 145 States, or any foreign government of a crime punishable by imprisonment for a 146 term of 1 year or more. The applicant will not be disqualified if such convictions 147 have been overturned or reversed by the court of jurisdiction or a pardon has been 148 obtained. On page 3, question number 7 of Mr. Bell's Character Affidavit, he

149		answered unknown to the question, I have not been convicted of any crime
150		involving the threat or the actual use of physical violence that would constitute a
151		Class 1 Misdemeanor in this state. On page 4 under section 3, criminal violations,
152		number 1, Mr. Bell reported that he was charged with assault in the 3 <sup>rd</sup> degree
153		where he plead guilty in 2005. Mr. Bell paid a fine. This crime is still punishable by

170		packet. I've never done this before, so I apologize.
171	STOLZ:	You are asking for them to be accepted, to be marked and accepted as exhibits.
172	CHAIR:	Mr. Stephenson, any objections?

190		anything opening up. And I think that carries a lot of weight for our agency to have
191		somebody that lives in the area, that wants to be in law enforcement and
192		specifically wants to work for your agency. We don't get a lot of applicants. So then
193		also the officer that was hired three years ago left in November and Dayton applied
194		right away. I think we had 8 applicants. Six interviewed. He scored the best. He
195	×	interviewed the best. He did a great job. So then, again, he discloses the assault
196		charge. So that's when I started the background investigation and couldn't find it
197		anywhere. You can call Wayne court, they didn't have anything. So then I
198		contacted Chief Chinn in Wayne, and he was able to send me the police report.

199		And I guess when I read the report, from what happened it gave me a little bit of
200		relief because I feel it was just, it was a poor choice with alcohol on his 21st
201		birthday you know, as opposed to a malevolent act of violence. He's had nothing of
202		the sort since then. All the other deputies that were involved in the hiring process,
203		they were made aware of it. They were comfortable with happened. It was 18 years
204		ago. Nobody wants to be involved in or being with him didn't feel he was that type
205		of person. So we're all in agreement to give him a shot. Thank you.

229		process. We were lucky enough to have a certified guy so he kind of got beat out
230		by that. He's never lied about the assault charge, even when he first applied with
231		us. We never really had to appeal anything because he was never, the applicant
232		was never sent down to the training center. I asked Dayton, I said so, you were
233		denied. We talked about it on the phone and I said, do you want go forward with
234		the appeal? He said, I want my chance to become a law enforcement officer. So to
235		me that means, and by his continuously calling one of our deputies and checking in
236		if we are hiring. I think Dayton is going to make a good officer if the chance arises.
237		We don't have a lot of turnover in Dixon County. So sometimes the chances to
238		getting on with us, it takes about 15-20 years. I don't know, maybe it's just been
239		good people in the area I guess, but, I think we're kind of an odd situation and
240		Dayton has been trying for 3 years. His wife is here to support him. So, I will just
241		hopefully, you'll reconsider, consider, you know, waiving his appeal process I
242		guess to allow him to come to the basic training. So, thank you.

6		Enforcement Training Center, Case Number 24 PSAC 100. I will now call the
7		meeting to order at 10:56 a.m. I will note that the following Council member are
8		present: myself Chief Reeves, Lt. Col. Duis, Chief Graham, Asst. Chief Jackson,
9		Sheriff Osmond, Mr. McCarthy, Deputy Chief Thomas.

100 CHAIR: Sheriff Sorenson, as the petitioner, you may make an opening statement at this 101 time. 102 SHERIFF: Yes. Good morning my name is Robert Sorenson, Cass County Sheriff, I just 103 want to open with thank you for doing the appeal. We understand the denial that 104 we received, and we are definitely not here to minimize what Dexter wrote on his 105 application. We just want to make sure you recognize that this incident did occur 106 many years ago. He was a minor. And I think at this point in time I have some 107 testimony later and thank you. 108 CHAIR: Thank you. Director Stephenson, do you wish an opening statement? DIRECTOR: Yes sir, Members of the Council, Dexter Taft's is currently employed at the Cass 109 110 County Sheriff's Office and has applied for the Nebraska Law Enforcement 111 Training Center basic police academy 217th class. On review of Mr. Taft's 112 application packet, the review consisted of comparing the information supplied by 113 Mr. Taft and his agency, as well as additional background information against the 114 standards as set forth in Nebraska Administrative Law Title 79, Chapter 8, The 115 basis for the denial of Mr. Taft's application is founded on the following grounds; 116 Nebraska Administrative Code Title 79, Chapter 8, section 005,02A, which 117 states, the Council finds that a person serving in the capacity of a Nebraska law 118 enforcement officer must be of good moral character, beside the requirement 119 imposed by section 005.01A-005.01Q, a person of good character is someone 120 who generally be defined as an individual who has not illegally sold, produced, 121 cultivated, or transported marijuana or other controlled substance. On page 7. 122 question number 1 in Mr. Taft's Personal Character Affidavit he answered yes to 123 the statement, under State or Federal law have you illegally sold, produced, 124 cultivated, or transported marijuana or other controlled substance for sale. Mr.

125		Taft also reported, quote, "In high school, estimated less than 2 grams total,
126		unknown date, time, location, Nebraska, somewhere between 2014 to 2018."
127		When we requested additional information Mr. Taft reported, "I attended high
128		school between the years of 2014 and 2018. During that time period I engaged in
129		the sale of less than 2 grams of marijuana to a classmate on 1 occasion. This
130		occurred somewhere in and or around Plattsmouth Nebraska." Mr. Taft's
131		disclosure of selling marijuana or other controlled substances is in direct conflict
132		with Title 79, Chapter 8, section 005.02A6a which has no time limitation. For this
133		reason, Mr. Taft's application for basic police academy training was denied.
134	CHAIR:	Thank you. Now is the time further evidence can be presented to the Council.
135		This may include written evidence, witness testimony and/or unsworn statements
136		by yourself.
137	CHAIR:	Sheriff Sorenson, do you have any written evidence for us to consider on behalf
138		of your agency or Mr. Taft?
139	SHERIFF:	I have 4 character reference letters. If I could step forward and produce these to
140		you?
141	CHAIR:	Sure. Thank you. Those letters have been marked as Exhibit 3, any objections
142		Mr. Stephenson?
143	DIRECTOR:	No.
144	CHAIR:	Let the record reflect that Exhibit 3 has been accepted into the record. Sheriff
145		Sorenson, do you have any additional evidence or testimony?
146	SHERIFF:	I do. Once again, good morning. I would just like to say that Dexter Taft, he is not
147		just a candidate, he's one of our employees. He's been employed at the Cass
148		County Sheriff's Office for approximately three years and two months. Where
149		he's a corrections officer in the Cass County Jail. I've had the pleasure and

opportunity for the past 16 months as the Cass County Sheriff to get to know Dexter. Just from our experience with Dexter, he is of high moral character. He's professional. He has high integrity. Something about him, when he started the Cass County Sheriff's Office before I took over, he went through a lifestyle change of wellness and fitness where he ended up losing 30 pounds and just living a healthy life during his time with the Cass County Sheriff's Office. When I took over he stepped in and approached and asked the new administration if he could introduce a wellness program. So he introduced a wellness program competition where people could compete to lose weight and/or increase your PRET score. Mr. Taft, he became, this last summer, an instructor in the TAP defensive tactics program. Where it's just not only defensive tactics but its health, wellness, de-escalation. So he is one of our new four instructors in the TAP program for Cass County Sheriff's Office. He also helped, in 2023, he also helped our PREA coordinator with one of our trainings. As I said before, we're not here to minimize this incident in any way, shape or form but the incident did occur approximately nine to ten years ago when he was 14 and 15 years of age. Today he is 24 years old. He's excited to become a deputy and I do believe he's a kind of a shining example of what we want all of our candidates to be. And like I said, he's of high integrity and he's professional and as I've said before, I am just here hopefully you can overturn Mr. Stephenson's decision and he'll be able to attend this next basic. We're also prepared when this decision is overturned and he's accepted, we're also prepared to submit his training hours so he can become an NCO and hopefully he can go do some ride-alongs and go do some things in the next couple of weeks before basic starts. And I will end with that.

184		leader is being persistent, having the ability to overcome and to adapt. Dexter
185		Taft is all these things. Having watched him over the years, he's simply, he failed
186		his written first go around. He went back, he studied, he passed it. He failed, he
187		came back, he failed his PRET. He went back, he dove into fitness, he became a
188		DT instructor, he looked more at nutrition, he came back, he passed both written,
189	14	his PRET and increased his PRET score by 30%. So that shows that he is very
190		persistent. He has the ability to adapt, and he does want to be here and
191		specifically for our agency. As our agency becomes more progressive and as our
192		agency sets higher expectations, we are looking specially for candidates like
193		Dexter Taft. I cannot express enough how much we have appreciated what he
194		has done for our agency and how he has stepped up in responsibility. So for
195		those reasons, we would ask that you overturn the appeal and allow him to
196		attend the next academy.

200	SHERIFF:	Yes. Dexter Taft. He would like to speak for a minute and of course answer any
201		questions that you members would have.
202	TAFT:	I'd kind of like, as Sheriff Sorenson said, this is an incident that happened 9 to 10
203		years ago. I was a kid in high school. I made a bad mistake and sold marijuana
204		one time to a friend. I had only done it that one time and never done it again in
205		my life. It was a simple mistake but as you've heard from both of them, I have
206		done a lot of things to turn my life around and like they said, I currently do work in
207		corrections, and I love my job working in corrections and working at the Cass
208		County Sheriff's Office and I just thank you guys for having me.
209	CHAIR:	Any questions Mr. Stephenson?
210	DIRECTOR:	No sir.
211	CHAIR:	Sheriff Sorenson, any additional evidence or testimony?
212	SHERIFF:	No I don't believe so. We rest.
213	CHAIR:	Director Stephenson, do you have any additional evidence or testimony to offer?
214	DIRECTOR:	No sir.
215	CHAIR:	Sheriff Sorenson you make your closing arguments at this time.
216	SHERIFF:	I just want to thank all of you for what you do for the State of Nebraska and for
217		law enforcement in the State of Nebraska. As I've said before, you know,
218		hopefully you guys consider the incident, when it occurred and as for how old he
219		was, him being a minor, now that he's 24 he's much more mature and once
220		again, he's high integrity and professional and we're excited to getting him into
221		this next basic and having him a certified deputy for the Sheriff's Office. So thank
222		you.
223	CHAIR:	Director Stephenson?

224	DIRECTOR:	Mr. Taft disclosed all necessary information and the facts presented to you were
225		discovered upon the review of his application to the Nebraska Law Enforcement
226		Training Center. This case is being presented to you today based upon that
227		information.
228	CHAIR:	Are there any questions from the Council?
229	OSMOND:	l do. What have you done, when did you do after this incident to make yourself
230		better?
231	TAFT:	After the incident in high school, I played a lot of sports in high school, just to
232		keep myself away from the drugs and everything like that. I was really big on
233		football. I really focused on football and trying to go to the next level with that.
234		Unfortunately I wasn't able to. And then after high school I worked at a couple of
235		different jobs trying to figure out what I wanted to do. I actually started college my
236		senior year in high school so that kept me very occupied. I found my way into law
237		enforcement, to corrections and it is a true passion of mine and I just strived to
238		make myself better in law enforcement, working out, and staying healthy and
239		encouraging my other co-workers to stay healthy and have an over-all better life.
240	OSMOND:	So this incident of selling marijuana, that made you want to change? What made
241		you want to stop selling, I am assuming using?
242	TAFT:	It, I just, I kind of looked at myself after it had happened and some family
243		members that knew that I indulged and smoked marijuana, and they kind came
244		to me and had a discussion with me and wanted me to get off of that path and
245		with them having that discussion with me, I listened, and I went down a different
246		path.
247	JACKSON:	I have a couple of questions. The reason for these questions is Title 79, Chapter
248		8, basically says, what have you done since this event. Looking at your personal

249		history statement, you had a bill go to collections from Nebraska Furniture Mart.
250		We're you going through any financial difficulties at the time or was it just a
251		misunderstanding, was it?
252	TAFT:	That was a misunderstanding. I had a credit card from Nebraska Furniture Mart
253		and to pay that credit card, they didn't have automatic payments. You had to go
254		in and set up and make payments on it. I had missed a payment on it 1 month
255		and for the 1 payment I missed they sent straight to collections. But when it got to
256		collections I immediately paid the whole thing off.
257	JACKSON:	I just noted that you paid it in full, I'm just asking
258	TAFT:	Ya, I paid it in full.
259	JACKSON:	You were terminated in a position, was that in high school, after high school?
260		Says you were terminated from an employment.
261	TAFT:	I was asked to quit in-lieu-of being fired.
262	JACKSON:	Ok. When was that?
<b>26</b> 3	TAFT:	That was after high school.
264	JACKSON:	Before your employment with Cass County Sheriff's Office?
<b>26</b> 5	TAFT:	Before Cass County Sheriff's Office, yes sir.
<b>26</b> 6	JACKSON:	Ok. Have you participated in anything else with Cass County the Sheriff's office
267		through different programs? We are looking for anything that we can put on the
268		positive side to counter why we're here.
269	TAFT:	Like they said, I created a healthy lifestyle competition for our department. I kind
270		of give people advise and try to help them with a healthier lifestyle and we had a
271		little competition with it. Like they also said, I am a defensive tactics instructor, I
272		also took a use of force instructor development class to further my instructorship

273		with defensive tactics and learning how to create lesson plans and various things
274		when it comes to my, when I do teach defensive tactics.
275	JACKSON:	Anything in the public at all?
276	TAFT:	I was the, sorry, I was the safety Pup for Halloween. It was a big puppy costume.
277	JACKSON:	This question is based on the previous hearings we've had. You sold about 2
278		grams of marijuana. Did you sell it to make a profit, did you sell it because you
279		bought 4 grams for 10 dollars and you were selling 2 grams for 5 dollars because
280		that was your cost?
281	TAFT:	Ya that's, the second thing you said. I bought it for 10 bucks and sold it for 5
282		dollars.
283	JACKSON:	You weren't making a profit, you were just recouping what you paid?
284	TAFT:	Ya.
<b>28</b> 5	CHAIR:	Any more questions?
286	DUIS:	When was the last time you smoked marijuana?
287	TAFT:	The last time I smoked marijuana was 2018.
288	DUIS:	Still in high school?
289	TAFT:	I was still in high school. Yes sir.
290	DUIS:	So how long did you smoke marijuana? How many years would you say you
291		smoked marijuana?
292	TAFT:	I smoked marijuana for probably a total of five times in my life. They were all
293		between 2014 and 2018.
294	DUIS:	Any other controlled substances?
295	TAFT:	No sir.
296	DUIS:	Going back to when you sold the 2 grams of marijuana. Describe that to me. How
297		did that come about?

298	TAFT:	I bought some marijuana from someone I knew, and I had a friend in high school
299		who knew I had bought some and he wanted some. He had asked me if he could
300		buy it from me. So I sold it.
301	DUIS:	How much did you buy?
302	TAFT:	I bought around 3 grams.
303	DUIS:	You bought 3 grams and sold 2?
304	TAFT:	Yep.
305	JACKSON:	Sheriff, can I ask you a question real quick?
306	SHERIFF:	Yes.
307	JACKSON:	Part of you hiring practice, how do you confirm the statements made by your
308		applicant?
309	SHERIFF:	Well, that's something after he got done, I wanted to ask if I could speak one
310		more time because I did forget to say something. But to answer your question,
311		that is, when he was hired by the Cass County Sheriff's Office he did go through
312		a polygraph. It's the same polygraph examiner that pretty much all of Sarpy
313		County, or most of the Sarpy County agencies use. And so related to all of the
314		drug and narcotic questions, there were no red flags and nothing that stood out
315		according to that polygraph examiner.
316	JACKSON:	Are you confident, based on the process that you initiated, that what Mr. uh, what
317		your candidate is telling you, is accurate and true?
318	SHERIFF:	Absolutely, a 100% yes.
319	CHAIR:	Anything else?
320	GRAHAM:	I move that the Council go into executive session based on the prevention of
321		needless injury to the reputation of Dexter Taft and for purpose of executive
