

# REGULAR MEETING OF THE POLICE STANDARDS ADVISORY COUNCIL October 15, 2025

#### I. CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Chief Steve Reeves called the meeting to order at 9:00 A.M. Legal notice of the meeting was published in the Lincoln Journal Star on October 8, 2025. Roll call; Sgt. Drew Bolzer, Chief Paul Graham, Mr. Matthew McCarthy, Sheriff Dan Osmond, Chief Steve Reeves, Asst. Chief Jason Stille, Deputy Chief Sherie Thomas. Absent from the meeting: Sheriff Greg London and Lt. Col. Jeff Roby.

# II. APPROVAL OF SEPTEMBER 17, 2025 P.S.A.C. MINUTES

Chief Reeves entertained a motion to approve the September 17, 2025 PSAC minutes.

## **MOTION**

Sheriff Osmond: I'll make a motion to approve the minutes. Chief Graham seconded the motion.

Voting in favor: Chief Graham, Mr. McCarthy, Sheriff Osmond, Chief Reeves, Asst. Chief Stille, Sgt. Bolzer. Abstained: Deputy Chief Thomas. Motion approved.

# III. REPORTS

# A. Director's Report

Director Mark Stephenson reported on the following:

 JTA: DAS has approved moving forward with contracting the vendor for a new Job Task Analysis. Agencies will receive an email from NLETC with details once the bid process has been completed and a vendor has been selected. Regional meetings will be held prior to the JTA surveys.



- HR has approved the new agency investigator position. The new investigator will begin work on November 3, 2025.
- There are still four instructor positions that are listed to be filled.

Chief Reeves asked about the time frame for the JTA. Director Stephenson responded that it should be 9-12 months. Director Stephenson also provided some background on the JTA surveys and the reasons behind the regional meetings.

# B. Deputy Director's Report

Deputy Director Gene Boner's reported:

- The 221<sup>st</sup> Basic Training Session: Starts September 2, 2025 with 51 students enrolled. 48 students are currently enrolled.
- The following training was held at NLETC:
  - Patrol Rifle Instructor: September 22-26, 2025-17 students enrolled.
  - Firearms Instructor Recertification: September 30, 2025-6 students enrolled.
  - Patrol Rifle Instructor Recertification: October 1, 2025-9 students enrolled.
  - Greg Goltz' Criminal Interdiction: October 7-9, 2025-16 students enrolled.
  - Management: October 14-16, 2025-40 students enrolled.
  - COPS Conference: September 25, 2025-approximately 200 students attended.

Mr. McCarthy thanked Deputy Director Boner, Director Stephenson and the staff for assisting with the C.O.P.S. conference.

1	A. Appea	al Hearing: Denial to attend basic training.
2	Aibor Huerta: South	Sioux City Police Department (25 PSAC-109)
3	CHAIR:	The matter now before the Police Standards Advisory Council is the
4		South Sioux City Police Department on behalf of its applicant, Aibor
5		Huerta v. the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center, Case Number
6		25-PSAC-109. I will call the hearing to order at 9:10 a.m.
7	CHAIR:	I'll note the following Council members are present; myself, Chief Steve
8		Reeves, Sgt. Drew Bolzer, Chief Paul Graham, Mr. Matthew McCarthy,
9		Sheriff Dan Osmond, Asst. Chief Jason Stille, Deputy Chief Sherie
10		Thomas. The following Council members are not present; Sheriff Greg
11		London and Lt. Col. Jeff Roby. I'll note that there's a quorum of the
12		Council present, so this hearing may proceed. Attorney Sara Bockstadter
13		is here as legal advisor to the Council.
14	CHAIR:	The Council has been asked by the Petitioner, South Sioux City Police
15		Department to consider reversing Director Stephenson's denial of Mr.
16		Huerta's entrance into the Basic Law Enforcement Officer Certification
17		course.
18	CHAIR:	The Council is here pursuant to its authority as stated in Nebraska
19		Revised Statute 81-1403, its related statutes and Title 79 of the Nebraska
20		Administrative Code. I will note that the petitioner is present through Lt.
21		McFee of the South Sioux City Police Department. I will also note that the
22		petitioner's applicant Aibor Huerta is present.
23	CHAIR:	Lt. McFee, are you represented by counsel?
24	MCFEE:	No I'm not.
25	CHAIR:	Mr. Huerta, are you represented by counsel?
		•

26 **HUERTA:** No. 27 CHAIR: The Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center Director Mark 28 Stephenson is present without counsel. Mr. Stephenson, will you be 29 presenting the case on behalf of the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training 30 Center? 31 Yes I will. STEPHENSON: 32 CHAIR: Does any party contest the Council's authority to hear this type of case? Director Stephenson? 33 34 STEPHENSON: No. 35 CHAIR: Lt. McFee? MCFEE: No. 36 37 CHAIR: Title 79 of the Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 8, specifies the 38 requirements that must be met by the applicant in order to be eligible for 39 the basic law enforcement officer certification course. Pursuant to Title 40 79, Chapter 8, section 008.01, upon request of an applicant or agency, 41 the Council will conduct a hearing in order to determine whether the 42 applicant meets the minimum qualifications for admission into a 43 certification course. The burden during the appeal hearing is on the 44 applicant to demonstrate by clear and convincing evidence that he meets 45 admission qualifications. Per Title 79, Chapter 13, section 004.02G, the 46 issues of this appeal will be limited to those raised in the request for 47 review and reconsideration as provided in section 004.02C and the 48 Director's written decision in response. The decision of the Council is 49 final.

50	CHAIR:	I want to go over some rights. As petitioner in this administrative hearing
51		you have the right to be heard either in person or by counsel who you hire
52		at your own expense. You also have the right to notice, this is to receive a
53		statement from the State, the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training
54		Center, detailing or justifying it's actions in this matter. Lt. McFee, do you
55		understand those rights?
56	MCFEE:	Yes.
57	CHAIR:	Did you receive such notice via letters from Director Stephenson stating
58		his reasons for denial of Aibor Huerta's basic application?
59	MCFEE:	Yes.
60	CHAIR:	Did you notice any defects in those letters that prejudiced you from
61		presenting your case?
62	MCFEE:	No.
63	CHAIR:	Additionally, you have the right to present evidence at this hearing, a right
64		to the Council's findings and a right to seek judicial review thereafter. Do
65		you understand these rights?
66	MCFEE:	Yes.
67	CHAIR:	The Police Standards Advisory Council shall act as the hearing board for
68		this appeal. Neither I nor any other Council member will be witness for
69		either side and I'm not aware of any matter which I believe may be
70		grounds for challenge by either side against me. Is there any member of
71		the Council that's aware of any matter which they believe may be grounds
72		for challenge by either side? Sgt. Bolzer?
73	BOLZER:	No.
74	CHAIR:	Chief Graham?

75 GRAHAM: No. 76 CHAIR: Mr. McCarthy? 77 MCCARTHY: No. 78 CHAIR: Sheriff Osmond? 79 OSMOND: No. 80 CHAIR: Lt. Col. Roby? 81 GOBEL: He's absent. 82 CHAIR: Oh, sorry. Wrong one. 83 CHAIR: Asst. Chief Stille? STILLE: 84 No. 85 CHAIR: **Deputy Chief Thomas?** 86 THOMAS: No. CHAIR: 87 Does either side have any questions or challenge for cause against any 88 member of the Council? 89 STEPHENSON: No sir. 90 CHAIR: Lt. McFee? 91 MCFEE: No. 92 CHAIR: Director Stephenson, do you have any procedural documents for this 93 case? 94 STEPHENSON: I do. If I could approach? I have two exhibits. Both are contained in the 95 same binder. The first exhibit is the admission documents from Mr. Huerta to the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center. The second 96 97 exhibit is the denial packet. Both are contained there. 98 CHAIR: Lt. McFee, do you have any objection to the receipt of these two exhibits? MCFEE: 99 No.

100 CHAIR: Let the record reflect that exhibits one and two have received and are 101 entered into the record. Does either side with to address any further 102 preliminary matters? 103 MCFEE: No. 104 CHAIR: Director Stephenson, do you wish to make an opening statement? 105 STEPHENSON: I do. Members of the Council, Mr. Huerta was appointed as a police 106 officer by the South Sioux City Police Department on March 6, 2025 and 107 he has applied for the basic police training course. I reviewed Mr. 108 Huerta's application. The review consisted of comparing the information 109 supplied by Mr. Huerta and his agency as well as additional background 110 information against the standards set forth in Nebraska Administrative 111 Law, Title 79, Chapter 8. The basis for the denial of Mr. Huerta's 112 application is founded on the following grounds; Nebraska Administrative 113 Code, Title 79, Chapter 8, section 005.02A(6)(b) states, "has not used 114 marijuana for any purposes in the last two years". On page three of the 115 personal character affidavit, the Nebraska Law Enforcement Certification, 116 question one state, "I have not used marijuana for any purposes in the 117 last two years preceding this application for admission, certification 118 training, or testing." Mr. Huerta responded "false". Mr. Huerta states on 119 page twelve that he used marijuana while on vacation in Colorado in 120 January of 2024. Mr. Huerta's admission to using marijuana twenty one 121 months prior to this hearing date is in conflict with Nebraska 122 Administrative Law, Title 79, Chapter 8, section 005.02A(6)(b) and for this 123 reason Mr. Huerta's application to the basic police academy was denied.

124	CHAIR:	Thank you. Now is the time that further evidence can be presented to the
125		Council. This may include written evidence, witness testimony and/or
126		unsworn statements by yourself of any other person. Lt. McFee, do you
127		have any written evidence for us to consider on behalf of your agency or
128		Mr. Huerta?
129	BOCKSTADTER:	Excuse me Mr. Chairman. They should be afforded the opportunity for
130		opening statements if they would like to make them.
131	CHAIR:	Go ahead.
132	MCFEE:	As far as an opening statement I'm just here on behalf of the South Sioux
133		City Police Department asking for a waiver to allow Mr. Huerta entrance
134		into the basic academy in January of "24. We do understand that he was
135		denied based on that two year rule where he admitted marijuana use.
136		However, by the time he does start the academy it should have met that
137		two year obligation, hopefully. As far as, we'll show as far as Mr. Huerta's
138		good moral character, we do believe that he does possess the moral
139		character. If he didn't, I don't believe I would be here today.
140	CHAIR:	Ok. Thank you. Do you have any written evidence?
141	MCFEE:	I don't have any new written evidence. I believe everything may already
142		be in the binder that was submitted by Chief Mahon back in July. There
143		were some performance evaluations by his field training officers as well
144		as some emails from other officers within the department.
145	STEPHENSON:	Supporting documents in exhibit two.
146	CHAIR:	Ok. Thank you. Do you have any additional testimony?
147	MCFEE:	I also have Mr. Huerta here to answer any questions. As far as Mr.
148		Huerta, prior to his employment, he did go through a testing phase in
		0

149		October and an extensive background was completed where we did a
150		review of different references, schools, colleges, employers, neighbors,
151		other types of family and friends. One of the questions we ask during a
152		background investigation is, does the applicant abuse or is known to
153		abuse alcohol or any type of drugs. Nobody gave any kind of indication
154		that Mr. Huerta abuses alcohol or any type of drugs to their knowledge.
155		After the interviews he was placed on the list for hiring. He was eventually
156		approved for hiring and then in March we did accept him as an officer.
157		And during his pre-employment drug screening, which should have been
158		included with his application packet, I do not believe that indicated any
159		kind of positive testing for THC or any kind of other illicit drugs. Since
160		March Mr. Huerta has been a trainee, a police trainee. He was an NCO
161		for a period of time and then back to a trainee and we have never had
162		any kind of indication that Mr. Huerta does not possess good moral
163		character. He's always on time. He's very respectful to his superiors. He
164		works well with members of the community. He has a very good work
165		ethic and attitude and we just really think that he would be an outstanding
166		addition to our department. And I think that's it. Unless you have any
167		questions for Mr. Huerta.
168	CHAIR:	Mr. Huerta, do you intend to speak this morning?
169	HUERTA:	Yes.
170	CHAIR:	Would you do me a favor? Raise your right hand. Do you swear the
171		testimony you are about to give is the whole truth and nothing but the
172		truth, so help you God?
173	HUERTA:	l do.

174	CHAIR:	Go ahead.
175	HUERTA:	So, when I put on the application that I used marijuana in Colorado. I
176		went for a concert. I was with a group of friends. They bought stuff. I
177		didn't buy anything personally. What I smoked was a THC (unintelligible)
178		my friend had offered me. I took one or two hits and that was it. At that
179		time I didn't think about my choices and how they would affect me in the
180		future. Ever since this roadblock has happened since I've been hired on
181		at the police department the same friends that I was with, they don't talk
182		to me anymore. They don't align with my goals. I cut them out of my life
183		and I want to be the best that I can.
184	REEVES:	Any member of the Council have questions?
185	STILLE:	So, you've been an employee with South Sioux City Police Department
186		for a few months?
187	HUERTA:	Yes. For seven months.
188	STILLE:	Walk me through some of the things that you've been doing for the police
189		department.
190	HUERTA:	I started my FTO phase and completed all of that up to phase three. After
191		that, after my second denial I got moved to the community service officer
192		and established that role in the meantime. Interacting with the community,
193		getting out in a patrol car. Even sometimes baseball games are
194		happening with little kids. I stop by to see what's going on. Just to show a
195		presence just the usual.
196	REEVES:	What are the primary roles of the community service officer?
197	HUERTA:	Parking tickets, small calls. Lost property calls. Just your small type of
198		calls.

199	MCCARTHY:	Are you working unsupervised then as a CSO? Do you have an officer
200		riding with you?
201	HUERTA:	No. I am not identifying as a police officer, just community service officer.
202	MCCARTHY:	Ok. And Lieutenant, he hasn't had any issues? Job related issues?
203	MCFEE:	No. He's operating basically, it's a civilian position.
204	MCCARTHY:	Ok.
205	OSMOND:	Do you guys polygraph?
206	MCFEE:	We do not.
207	OSMOND:	Do you do anything else to be a positive member of the community? Do
208		you volunteer for things or?
209	HUERTA:	Yes. I, back in August I went to a bike rodeo for kids at the YMCA. Made
210		presence there. Showed up with the police car and interacted with the
211		kids. I also during our parades, I set up temporary no parking signs and I
212		make sure to do a good job.
213	CHAIR:	This was a one time use within the sixteen, seventeen months before you
214		came out here?
215	HUERTA:	Yes.
216	CHAIR:	What about prior to that?
217	HUERTA:	I did use in my senior year but again I was in a small town and being a
218		teen, I guess, I learned from that as I got older it was not what I wanted to
219		do. I tried to learn from my mistakes. There's not much else I can do but
220		to learn from the past.
221	CHAIR:	Any other questions from the Council members?
222	THOMAS:	Mr. Huerta, why do you want to be a police officer?

223	HUERTA:	I saw a lot of them when I was a kid. It wasn't always in the plan but being
224		a kid I think it's every kids dream to be a cop, to be driving down the
225		street. It would be something cool to do when you get older. At the time,
226		being a kid it's pretty cool to see that. As I've gotten older I had taken a
227		job with the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services and from
228		there I liked that job about halfway through I realized it's a good
229		steppingstone to law enforcement and I decided to make the jump from
230		the jail to the streets. It wasn't always part of the plan but now I
231		(unintelligible).
232	THOMAS:	Thank you.
233	OSMOND:	Other than not hanging out with that crowd anymore that you smoked
234		marijuana with, is there anything else that you've changed to make sure
235		that it doesn't happen again?
236	HUERTA:	I go to the gym. I run. I like to stay in shape and the gym helps with my
237		problems. So I've stayed in my routine for the past two years.
238		(Unintelligible), eating clean.
239	CHAIR:	Anything else? Mr. Stephenson, do you have any questions of this
240		witness?
241	STEPHENSON:	No sir.
242	CHAIR:	Lt. McFee, do you have any additional testimony to offer?
243	MCFEE:	Not much other than just reiterating what Mr. Huerta said. That since he's
244		been put in that civilian position he has really done an outstanding job.
245		He's done a lot of community events on behalf of the police department,
246		with the police officers where there's a lot of community involvement. He
247		went to an event, which was with Sioux City called Unity in the
		13

248		Community and it was remarked by Chief Mueller that he was impressed
249		with Mr. Huerta, his appearance, his performance at the event as well. I
250		think ultimately he talks about the group that he had went with. A lot of the
251		people he aligns with now are people who also aspire to be in law
252		enforcement. So when he says he has changed his crowd I truly believe
253		that. I think he's hanging out more with people who are in law
254		enforcement.
255	CHAIR:	Director Stephenson, do you have any additional evidence or testimony to
256		offer?
257	STEPHENSON:	No sir.
258	CHAIR:	Lt. McFee, you may make your closing argument at this time.
259	MCFEE:	Very similar to my opening, I would like to reiterate that Mr. Huerta's
260		admission of the use of marijuana was in January of 2024. The basic that
261		he's applying for is in January of 2026 which would meet that two year
262		requirement. He, I do believe he does possess good moral character,
263		excellent performance and attitude that he's exhibited during his FTO
264		period. I just believe he does possess good moral character and should
265		be admitted into the January 2026 basic on behalf of South Sioux City
266		Police Department.
267	CHAIR:	Director Stephenson, you can make your closing argument at this time.
268	STEPHENSON:	Thank you. Mr. Huerta disclosed all necessary information and provided
269		the requested legal documents which appear before you today in exhibits
270		one and two. This case is being presented to you based upon this
271		information.
272	CHAIR:	Any questions of anyone by any of the Council members?

273 **BOCKSTADTER:** Mr. Chairman, Mr. Huerta may make a closing statement if he so 274 chooses. Go ahead. 275 CHAIR: 276 **HUERTA**: Again, my life has changed in the last couple of years. I'm doing better in 277 life. If I wasn't dedicated to being a police officer for South Sioux City 278 Police Department I wouldn't be here right now after being rejected twice. 279 I'm dedicated to give my full 100% to this career. I really want to do this 280 work. That's all I've got to say. 281 CHAIR: Thank you. Both sides have rested. Is there any motions? 282 OSMOND: I would move that the Council go into executive session based on the 283 prevention of needless injury to the reputation of Mr. Huerta and for the 284 purpose of executive session we will allow the following to remain in the 285 room; all Council members and Legal Advisor Sara Bockstadter. 286 MCCARTHY: Second. 287 CHAIR: Any discussion on the motion? Hearing none, let's vote. 288 GOBEL: Mr. McCarthy? 289 MCCARTHY: Yes. 290 GOBEL: Sheriff Osmond? 291 OSMOND: Yes. 292 GOBEL: Chief Reeves? 293 CHAIR: Yes. 294 Asst. Chief Stille? GOBEL: 295 STILLE: Yes. 296 GOBEL: Deputy Chief Thomas? 297 THOMAS: Yes.

298 GOBEL: Sgt. Bolzer? 299 **BOLZER:** Yes. Chief Graham? 300 GOBEL: 301 GRAHAM: Yes. 302 GOBEL: Motion approved. We are in executive session at 9:32 a.m. 303 CHAIR: The meeting of the Police Standards Advisory Council will come to order. 304 Is there a motion to come out of executive session? 305 MCCARTHY: I'll make the motion to come out of executive session? 306 **GRAHAM:** Second. 307 CHAIR: Any discussion on the motion? ## C. Revocation Hearing Request

Robert Rivera: LR-238-22

Agency Counsel Sara Bockstadter provided a background of the request. Mr. Rivera sent an email to PSAC Secretary Mr. Gobel on September 26, 2025 requesting that the Council move his de-certification hearing to Lincoln Nebraska so his witnesses could find it easier travelling. During the pre-hearing conference on August 25, 2025 Mr. Rivera was informed of the rules for subpoenas and that witnesses can't be compelled to testify more than one hundred miles away.

Sgt. Bolzer asked where the meeting would be held if it was moved to Lincoln. Sara Bockstadter replied that would be decision the Council would have to make so notice of the meeting and subpoenas, if needed, could be sent out. Sgt. Bolzer asked where Mr. Rivera was from. Mr. Hendricks responded that the address he had for Mr. Rivera was in Lyons Nebraska.

Sara Bockstadter did report that Title 53, which is the rule and regulation that deals with contested hearings, 007.03 allow a hearing to be conducted in part or in full by telephone, television or other electronic means.

#### **MOTION**

Sheriff Osmond: I make a motion that we deny his request to move the meeting to Lincoln. Mr. McCarthy seconded the motion.

#### DISCUSSION

Council members asked if the electronic appearances could be recorded. Sara Bockstadter responded that the Council could make the decision today to deny the request to move the physical hearing location but that witness would be allowed to appear remotely. Mr. Hendricks also reported that at this time it is not known if Mr. Rivera is planning on subpoenaing witnesses.

Chief Reeves asked if the Council is allowing witnesses to appear electronically would Mr. Rivera be able to appear electronically as well. Sara Bockstadter responded that it would be up to the Council to decide that and that Mr. Rivera was given the opportunity to appear at the Council meeting to present information. Chief Reeves asked if the decision to allow electronic participation needed to be decided today. Sara Bockstadter recommended that it should be part of the motion today to give proper notice to Mr. Rivera. The motion was not changed.

D. Extension of 1-Year Requirement to Attend Management

Director Mark Stephenson reported that Lt. Corey Brown requested an extension in order to complete the online portion of management training.

Sheriff Osmond: I'll make a motion that we grant the extension of the 1-year requirement to Corey Brown of the Bellevue Police Department on the grounds that he attends the next available online class. Mr. McCarthy seconded the motion.

2. Dustin Franks: Bellevue Police Department

Director Stephenson reported that Lt. Franks requested an extension due to not getting into the in-person management course due to the class being at capacity. Classroom space has been limited to 40 students due to office space.

Sheriff Osmond: I'll make a motion that we extend the 1-year requirement for Dustin Franks to attend management class on the next available class. Chief Graham seconded the motion.

Sgt. Bolzer asked if the waiver was for both in-person and online management. Director Stephenson replied that the waiver was just for the in-person course.

Chief Graham added the in-person requirement to the motion. Sheriff Osmond seconded the motion.

G. Waiver of Patrol Rifle Instructor Recertification In Lieu of NLETC Patrol Rifle Instructor Recertification Course

Joshua Fink: Hastings Police Department

Deputy Director Gene Boner reported that NLETC Instructor Wyatt Hoagland hosted and attended a Carbine Rifle Instructor course conducted by Costa Ludus Training from August 25-28, 2025. Mr. Hoagland evaluated the course in comparison to the NLETC Patrol Rifle Recertification course and found that the course covered all areas required by the NLETC curriculum set out in Title 79, Chapter 11. The Costa Ludus course did not meet the NLETC standards for the instructor qualification shoot. Mr. Hoagland had Mr. Fink complete the NLETC Instructor Qualification at the end of the Costa Ludus course and Mr. Fink passed the qualification. Deputy Director Boner recommended granting Joshua Fink's request for this training to count as his Patrol Rifle Instructor Recertification in lieu of attending the NLETC Patrol Rifle Instructor Recertification course.

#### **MOTION**

Sheriff Osmond: I'll make a motion to approve the waiver of the Patrol Rifle Instructor Recertification course in lieu of the NLETC's course for Joshua Fink of the Hastings Police Department as presented by Deputy Director Gene Boner. Mr. McCarthy seconded the motion.

Voting in favor: Chief Graham, Mr. McCarthy, Sheriff Osmond, Chief Reeves, Asst. Chief Stille, Deputy Chief Thomas, Sgt. Bolzer. Motion approved.

The Council took a break from 10:09-10:15 a.m.

- Lt. Col. Jeff Roby arrived to the meeting before the end of the break.
  - H. Projected Enrollment and Recommendations to Seat Allocations for the Next Calendar Year (Chapter 6, Sec. 003.03)

Director Mark Stephenson reported that NLETC currently has nine instructors. NLETC still has three instructors left to hire. With the current instructors Director Stephenson reported that they could take up to 55 students in the basic class. It would be a push for driving due to the new construction. Once the instructional staff is fully staffed the number of students for a basic class could go up to 60.

The Council discussed the options with the different numbers and how that was going to affect regional training and the issues of instructors not being able to burn comp time and vacation time. The consensus was that if the basic class enrollment number is raised to 60 there would be very limited regional training.

### **MOTION**

Sheriff Osmond: I would make the motion that we leave the maximum number of students at 50 to be reviewed up to 55 if needed.

#### DISCUSSION

Sgt. Bolzer asked if that would leave NLETC enough time for the next academy class deadline to get 55 in if the Council had to review that. Director Stephenson and Deputy Director Boner agreed that NLETC would have the time.

Deputy Chief Thomas seconded the motion in order to continue the discussion. Mr. McCarthy asked if those seats were still only going to be for students who are hired by agencies. Director Stephenson confirmed that NLETC would still not be accepting non law students.

Voting in favor: Mr. McCarthy, Sheriff Osmond, Lt. Col. Roby, Asst. Chief Stille, Deputy Chief Thomas, Chief Graham. Voting against: Chief Reeves, Sgt. Bolzer. Motion approved.

### I. State Academy Curriculum

Deputy Director Gene Boner presented the annual review and update of the current NLETC curriculum. The Council was provided with an overview of the new curriculum as

well as a copy of the 2026 curriculum with the changes highlighted. The changes in the number of curriculum hours were proposed for the following:

- A decrease of one hour of cognitive testing hours. Defensive Tactics testing will be held following the lecture and critical skill instruction rather than being held as a stand-alone unit exam.
- Several course hours will be re-allocated within course from one type of instruction to another. (For example: online to lecture, lecture to skills).

Additionally the re-allocation of hours from one course to another will be made and these re-allocations would equate to no overall changes in basic hours. The 2025 curriculum is currently 640 hours and the proposed 2026 curriculum would be 639 hours. Several of the job tasks that were considered not in the 2018 JTA yet were still included in the curriculum and lesson plans would be removed. Some job tasks considered in the JTA yet not represented in courses will be added.

Deputy Director Boner outlined changes to language, wording and grammar changes to better align with current practices. Several courses will be merged to better align with course content to allow for more consistent testing on unit exams. Several objectives were archived or combined with existing objectives with similar content. This will be a continuous process to better align with requirement that all objective be tested either in a unit exam or practical skill testing.

Deputy Director Boner gave credit to his instructional staff and his support staff for the work they did on the curriculum

#### MOTION

Sheriff Osmond: I'll make a motion to approve the 2026 basic curriculum as presented by Deputy Director Gene Boner. Lt. Col. Roby seconded the motion.

Voting in favor: Sheriff Osmond, Chief Reeves, Lt. Col. Roby, Asst. Chief Stille, Deputy Chief Thomas, Sgt. Bolzer, Chief Graham, Mr. McCarthy. Motion approved.

# J. Revision of the Comprehensive Practical Testing Standards

Deputy Director Gene Boner presented changes to the way NLETC conducts the Comprehensive Practical testing. The current practice for testing requires instructors to individually observe each student during the scenario, assess their performance and evaluate each recruit's written reports and scenario documentation. This does meet the requirements of a smaller academy class but it has become increasingly inefficient. In the past five years there have been no students separated from training for failing the comprehensive practical test. The evaluation process requires a lot of time and effort on behalf of the instructors and as a result students receive a performance feedback up to 48 hours after the practical.

Current staffing levels do not allow or permit comprehensive one on one evaluations and coaching immediately following the comprehensive scenarios.

Deputy Director Boner made the following recommendations:

- That the academy transition to more of a Field Training style observation and evaluation model for all practical skill days. The revised approach would utilize a standard score sheet modeled after a Field Training Officer Phase 4 evaluation form. This form is reflective of real world law enforcement performance standards.
- Will focus on real time observation and immediate feedback rather than delayed written evaluations.
- Will apply the same evaluation tool across all of the scenario based training days to ensure consistency and streamlined assessment of those.
- Evaluate students based on objective performance and behaviors and ensures best law enforcement policies, procedures and tactics.
- Mimic performance in a FTO based manner. Allowing for immediate feedback and retention by the instructor and coaching in a timely manner that is more meaningful and productive to the student.
- Will change the comprehensive practical from a pass/fail to a collective assessment of all skill days which is going to focus on improvement and allows better tracking of any improvement or non-improvement.
- If little to no acceptable level of improvement is observed, the agency head will be contacted and informed of the concerns being seen of their students lack of progress during training.

During basic training the students are tested on their knowledge and comprehension during unit exams and during various skill days. There are approximately fifteen different skill days where students are evaluated and coached immediately. Each skill day builds on the previous one thereby allowing students to demonstrate their ability to apply everything they've learned thus far. Currently during the comprehensive practical the students do not receive any help, any feedback, direction or coaching by the instructor. By using a field training officer evaluation during basic it will give the students a more realistic evaluation that relates to their time with a Field Training Officer after graduation. This approach emphasizes decision making, officer safety, communication and adherence to core department policies all in operational context. The students will receive immediate feedback after scenarios allowing the instructors to address specific actions, decisions and tactics while they're memories are still fresh.

The use of FTO score sheets on all skill days will allow documentation of improvements and/or deficiencies clearly throughout the basic training. Instructors will still evaluate reports, evidence packaging, document handling and proper completion of paperwork.

This would not effect how the other academies conduct their comprehensive skills day.

Director Stephenson commented that the current comprehensive practical day is not a learning day, it is just a survival day.

## **MOTION**

Deputy Chief Thomas: I move to approve the revisions of the comprehensive practical testing standards as presented. Asst. Chief Stille seconded the motion.

#### DISCUSSION

Sheriff Osmond asked if the change aligns better with today's students for learning ability. Mr. McCarthy responded that it is more in line with what he sees from this generation of students. Sgt. Bolzer recommended that a minimum pass/fail standard should be applied to the skills days for an overall standard. Chief Reeves stated that the motion was to approve the change but that the intention is to come up with something that will identify a substandard student.

Voting in favor: Chief Reeves, Lt. Col. Roby, Asst. Chief Stille, Deputy Chief Thomas, Sgt. Bolzer, Chief Graham, Mr. McCarthy, Sheriff Osmond. Motion approved.

## K. Physical Tasks Discussion

Director Mark Stephenson had supplied the Council with a handout by email detailing options for the physical entrance standard for the academy. After presenting the options and the discussion from the Council there was no action taken. Director Stephenson will bring details as a voting item to the November meeting.
