NEBRASKA COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE

July 23, 2010

The Nebraska Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice met Friday, July 23, 2010 at 9:30 AM in Lower Level Conference Room A of the Nebraska State Office Building, 301 Centennial Mall South, Lincoln, Nebraska. Legal notice of the meeting was published July 9, 2010 in the Lincoln Journal Star.

As amended by LB 898, 2005 Legislature, a copy of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act was available for public review.

I. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 9:31 AM by Acting Chairman John Freudenberg. The following members were **in attendance**: Acting Chair John Freudenberg, Candice Batton, James Bogner, Bill Brueggemann, Scot Ford, Alex Hayes, Kathy Moore (arrived at 9:34 AM), Mike Moser, Richard Pierce, Brenda Smith, Bryan Tuma, Derek Vaughn and William White. **Members excused**: Robert Houston, Gary Lacey, Don Overman and Fred Ruiz. **Staff present**: Michael Behm, William Muldoon, Bruce Ayers, Michael Overton, Jennifer Kirkpatrick, Lisa Stamm, Tiffany Mullison, Merry Wills, Monica Miles-Steffens, Michael Friend, David Stolz, Marin Hoffman and Sarah Schoen.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

*Motion*

*A motion was made by Moser and seconded by White to approve the minutes of the Crime Commission meeting of May 7, 2010; Nebraska Coalition for Juvenile Justice meeting of June 4, 2010; Crime Commission Grant Review Committee meeting of July 6, 2010; and the Police Standards Advisory Council meetings of April 21 and May 19, 2010. The motion passed unanimously by acclamation.*

III. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Mike Behm presented his Executive Director's report noting the following:

- He and the Grants Division Staff met with Douglas County Officials regarding the Domestic Violence Coordinating Council (DVCC) grant. After this meeting, some guidelines were established and a re-submittal date for the DVCC application set.

The application was resubmitted by this date on July 19, 2010. The application looks good and the problem appears to have been averted.

- Today is Jennifer Kirkpatrick's last day with the Crime Commission. She is taking a new position with the Nebraska State Patrol.
- This is the last Crime Commission meeting for Sarah Schoen as well. Her last day with the Crime Commission will be July 27, 2010. She will be the Lieutenant Governor's new Administrative Assistant.
- On July 22, 2010, he and Denny Macomber met with the Douglas County Corrections Administrator regarding their 2009 jail inspection in which they were found in non-compliance. Some strategies were developed from this meeting and the Board will be kept apprised of what transpires.

#### V. NEW BUSINESS

##### A. **Final Revocation Decision LR-068-09 Timothy L. Otte – Sarpy County Sheriff's Office**

James Bogner gave a procedural overview of the revocation process. He informed the Board that the case file contains the following information: the informal complaint, notice to the officer of the informal complaint, the officer's informal answer (if any is filed), the Executive Director's correspondence, the formal complaint filed and the respondent officer's consent decree to the revocation action, which is essentially a voluntary relinquishment of the officer's certificate.

Bogner stated that the case before the Board today was uncontested and has a signed consent decree in the file. Bogner reviewed the case with the Board and offered the file into evidence. He then asked for a motion from the Board to either approve or deny revocation of Mr. Otte's law enforcement certification.

#### *Motion*

*A motion was made by White and seconded by Brueggemann to uphold the Police Standards Advisory Council's decision to revoke the Law Enforcement certification of Timothy L. Otte, LR-068-09. Voting in favor of the motion: Batton, Brueggemann, Ford, Hayes, Moore, Moser, Pierce, Smith, Tuma, Vaughn and White. Abstaining from the motion: Bogner. Motion carried unanimously.*

**B. Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center**

**1. Instructor Certifications**

The Crime Commission next considered *two* requests for **Professional Instructor Recertification**. The Police Standards Advisory Council's recommendations were reported by James Bogner.

*Motion*

*A motion was made by Smith and seconded by Hayes to grant the following instructor certifications per Police Standards Advisory Council's recommendations: Professional Instructor Recertification to Jeremiah J. Harmon, Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center and James B. Stover, Nebraska State Patrol. Voting in favor of the motion: Batton, Brueggemann, Ford, Hayes, Moore, Moser, Pierce, Smith, Tuma, Vaughn and White. Abstaining from the motion: Bogner. Motion carried unanimously.*

**2. 2010 Lincoln Police Academy Inspection**

James Bogner reviewed the recommendations of the Police Standards Advisory Council on the inspection of the Lincoln Police Academy.

*Motion*

*A motion was made by Ford and seconded by Tuma to approve the Lincoln Police Academy Inspection per the Police Standards Advisory Council's recommendations. Voting in favor of the motion: Batton, Brueggemann, Ford, Hayes, Moore, Moser, Pierce, Smith, Tuma, Vaughn and White. Abstaining from the motion: Bogner. Motion carried unanimously.*

**C. Release of Crime Statistics in Nebraska**

Chairperson John Freudenberg informed the Board that a copy of the Press Release regarding the Crime Statistics in Nebraska was emailed to them prior to this meeting. If for any reason a Board member did not receive this Press Release, a copy of it can be found on the Crime Commission's website.

**D. Award of 2009 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Title V Formula Grant Funds - \$33,486**

Tiffany Mullison reviewed the funds available under the 2009 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, Title V formula grant program. She stated these are federal funds which are earmarked for initiatives that address Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC). The total amount available for award was \$33,486. There were 14 counties eligible to apply of which only three (3) applications were received. One application applied for second year funding [Platte County]; two applications applied for new funding [Lancaster and Douglas Counties]. Subgrantees are eligible for up to three years of funds, at the same level each year.

The NCJJ voted to uphold the recommendations from the Grant Review Team, which were to reduce the level of funding to Platte County by \$1,300 and fund both new projects at approximately half of the funds requested.

Mullison commented that the amount of funds available in FY10 is \$84,985, which is substantially larger than the \$33,486 available for award this year.

*Motion*

*A motion was made by Moore and seconded by Vaughn to accept the Coalition's funding recommendations and contingency stipulations of award as outlined for the \$33,486 of 2009 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Title V Formula Grant Funds. Voting in favor of the motion: Batton, Bogner, Brueggemann, Ford, Hayes, Moore, Moser, Pierce, Smith, Tuma, Vaughn and White. Motion carried unanimously.*

**E. Award of 2009 Juvenile Accountability Block Grant (JABG) Funds - \$427,310**

Mullison reported that the JABG funds are federal funds. She explained that the amount of funds a city or county can request is predetermined based upon its youth population. There were four Cities/Counties eligible to apply and each did at the amount they were eligible to receive. Mullison reported that for the first time since FY2005, Hall County was eligible to apply.

In addition to the predetermined award funds, Mullison stated that each State has retained funds. Annual meetings are held with key stakeholders and members of the NCJJ to discuss how these funds will best benefit the State. As a result, the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services was asked to apply in order to support the School Intervention Worker program, which serves five communities across the State [Kearney, North Platte, Columbus, Grand Island and Lexington].

Mullison reported that the NCJJ voted to uphold the recommendations from the Grant Review Team, which was to fully fund all applicants.

*Motion*

*A motion was made by Vaughn and seconded by Moore to accept the Coalition's funding recommendations and contingency stipulations of award as outlined for the \$427,310 of 2009 Juvenile Accountability Block Grant (JABG) Funds. Voting in favor of the motion: Bogner, Brueggemann, Ford, Hayes, Moore, Moser, Pierce, Smith, Tuma, Vaughn and White. Abstaining from the motion: Batton. Motion carried unanimously.*

**F. Update on Juvenile Detention Alternative Initiative (JDAI)**

Mullison provided an update regarding the progress of a Juvenile Services award that the Board approved at the May 2009 meeting. At this meeting, Mullison provided the Board with four (4) different options that would fully expend the \$52,508 in state Juvenile Services funds which had not been recommended for award by the Grant Review Team or the NCJJ. The Crime Commission reviewed these options and chose to award 100% of the funds to pursuing a Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative [JDAI]. As a result, these funds were awarded to Douglas County, which conducted a Readiness Assessment Consultation with the W. Haywood Burns Institute in April 2010. They then participated in a meeting with leadership from the Annie E. Casey Foundation in May 2010, and the findings from the RAC report will be presented by Burns Institute staff in Omaha on July 27, 2010. Mullison encouraged the Board members to attend or request a copy of the report.

**G. Award of 2010 Violence of Crime Act (VOCA) Grant Funds – \$2,739,730**

- Contingent upon receipt of federal award

Lisa Stamm stated that the estimated funds available for victim service programs total \$2,573,540. The Crime Commission had a carry over of \$101,023 from FY 2009 and an estimated \$52,559 in state appropriated funds. The estimated 2010 federal grant award is \$2,739,730, which is contingent upon receipt of federal award.

Thirty-eight (38) applications were received by the Commission. There were no new programs and no programs were denied funding.

Stamm reported that VOCA funds are utilized for providing direct services to individual crime victims at no cost to that victim. The services provided include responding to the emotional and physical needs of the crime victims, assisting both primary and secondary crime victims stabilize their lives after victimization, and assisting with these victims' participation in the criminal justice system in order to ensure the crime victims have a measure of safety and security.

Stamm informed the Board that estimated allocated amount of federal funds available for award is lower than initially expected. As a result, she handed out a revised listing for the FY 10 VOCA grant recipients that included the revised amounts each recipient will receive. Stamm noted that all but five programs received a minor deduction in their overall funding. The five programs that received no deductions were already funded with a low amount and would be significantly hurt by a \$2,000 to \$3,000 decrease. She stated that the City of Kearney was already reduced prior to last year's funding level during the staff and grant review process, and the VINE program needs the exact amount to operate the Victim Notification System.

## *Motion*

*A motion was made by Vaughn and seconded by Smith to accept the funding recommendations and contingency stipulations of award as outlined by the Grant Review Committee for the \$2,739,730 Violence of Crime Act (VOCA) Grant Funds contingent upon receipt of federal award. Voting in favor of the motion: Batton, Bogner, Brueggemann, Ford, Hayes, Moore, Moser, Smith, Tuma, Vaughn (abstained from grants 10-VA-203/09-VA-242) and White. Abstaining from the motion: Pierce. Motion carried unanimously.*

#### **H. Award of 2010 BYRNE/JAG/STATE Funds – Total Award: \$1,791,273; Local Projects Award: \$1,087,897; State Projects Award: \$449,028**

Kirkpatrick reported the estimated award for the 2010 BYRNE/JAG/STATE funds will be contingent upon receipt of federal award.

Kirkpatrick stated there is an estimated total of \$1,791,273 available to award. The amount received by the State and Local entities is dictated by a formula set in place by the Federal Government. The amount available for award to the Local Projects is \$1,087,897, and the amount available for award to the State Projects is \$703,376, which is a 1.28% increase from 2009.

Kirkpatrick informed the Board that the grants went through two phases of review. During these reviews, discussion was held on matters pertaining to supplanting, justification of requests and priority use of the funds. The recommendations for funding were based on the following:

- The written grant (did it show completeness, clarity, continuity and consistency;
- Did it maintain the overall goal of the funds; and
- Was the documentation provided to prevent any issues of supplanting?

Kirkpatrick reported that all funds appropriated for Local Projects were awarded. The first priority of funding was given to active task forces in order to support their efforts. There were some equipment requests that did not tie specifically into the functions of a drug and violent crime task force that were deemed second priority. Due to the lack of funds after funding the active task forces, these equipment requests were denied.

Kirkpatrick next noted that a specialized financial monitor was conducted for the state appropriated funds in order to prevent supplanting with the ARRA JAG funds. She informed the Board there was \$254,348 remaining in State appropriated funds. The Grant Review Committee recommended that a small portion of the State funds (\$40,000) be designated to task force training initiatives. The remaining funds will be held over and announced with the following year's funds in order to assist State agency projects who are facing dramatic budget cuts.

She stated the Board will be kept apprised of decisions made regarding this matter.

*Motion*

*A motion was made by Moser and seconded by Vaughn to accept the Grant Review Committee's funding recommendations and contingency stipulations of award as outlined for the 2010 BYRNE/JAG/STATE Funds – Total Award: \$1,791,273; Local Projects Award: \$1,087,897; and State Projects Award: \$449,028 contingent upon receipt of federal award. Voting in favor of the motion: Batton, Bogner, Brueggemann, Ford, Hayes (abstained from grant 10-DA-303), Moore, Moser, Pierce, Smith, Tuma (abstained from grant 10-DA-308), Vaughn and White. Motion carried unanimously.*

**I. Update on ARRA JAG**

Monica Miles-Steffens next provided an update regarding the ARRA JAG funds. She stated that they are looking at what can be done to make this money easier for programs to apply for, which resulted in this next round of ARRA JAG funds focusing primarily on evidence based types of practices. Miles-Steffens stated that she conducted an application workshop for those programs interested in applying for these funds. This provided an opportunity for programs to have questions answered and seek guidance as to what “evidence based practices” truly means. She also informed the Board that permission was granted for them to adjust the match funds to a 25% cash or in kind match for existing projects. New, evidence based projects will only be required to do a 5% match. This provides more flexibility for the programs interested in applying. The goal for this round of ARRA JAG funds is to make it easier for programs to apply and to encourage new innovative projects throughout the criminal justice system.

Miles-Steffens stated that they can ask for an extension for the ARRA VAWA funds; however, the extension cannot be requested until January 2011.

**J. Award of Requested ARRA VAWA Increases**

Miles-Steffens stated that at the November 2009 Board meeting, the majority of the ARRA VAWA funds were awarded. However, there were funds remaining in the following categories: Culturally Specific, Prosecution and Law Enforcement. She stated that because of the expiration date and not knowing whether or not an extension of these funds would be granted, there was not time to re-announce the funds for another competitive process. As a result, it was recommended that the remaining Culturally Specific funds (\$7,183) be added to the Family Violence Council's initial award, an additional \$9,375 of Law Enforcement funds be added to the Nebraska State Patrol's initial award, and an additional \$95,451 of Prosecution funds be added to the Domestic Violence Coordinating Council's (DVCC) initial award. After these recommendations were made, notification was received from the OJP VAWA office that a no-cost 12 month extension can be requested; however,

this cannot be done until January 2011 and will be handled on a case-by-case basis with no guarantees.

*Motion*

*A motion was made by Vaughn and seconded by Moore to accept the funding recommendations and contingency stipulations for the requested ARRA VAWA increases. Voting in favor of the motion: Batton, Bogner, Brueggemann, Ford, Hayes (abstained from grant 09-WX-7011), Moore, Moser, Pierce, Smith, Tuma (abstained from grant 09-WX-7006), Vaughn (abstained from grant 09-WX-7011) and White. Motion carried unanimously.*

**VI. OTHER BUSINESS**

Bogner provided an update regarding the revocation process outlined in NAC Title 79, Chapter 9. He stated that this had been previously submitted for revision, but has been pulled out of the revision process due to questions asked regarding whether or not a felony conviction was necessary for revocation and whether or not a mandatory reporting requirement of a violation to the PSAC was required. He stated that the PSAC will be looking at the revocation process of other states and will be considering all questions asked. They will then submit a revised NAC Title 79, Chapter 9 for review and approval at a later date.

**VII. PUBLIC COMMENT**

There were no members of the public present who wished to address the Board at this time.

**VIII. ADJOURNMENT**

The next scheduled meeting of the Commission will be **Friday, October 22, 2010 at 9:30 AM in the Nebraska State Office Building, Lower Level Conference Room A, Lincoln, Nebraska.**

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 10:22 AM.
