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NEBRASKA COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE

May 2, 2008

The Nebraska Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice met Friday, May 2, 2008 at 9:30 AM in Lower Level Conference Room A of the Nebraska State Office Building, 301 Centennial Mall South, Lincoln, Nebraska. Legal notice of the meeting was published April 18, 2008 in the Lincoln Journal Star.

As amended by LB 898, 2005 Legislature, a copy of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act was available for public review.

I. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 AM by Acting Chairman David Cookson. The following members were **in attendance**: Acting Chair David Cookson, Scott Arnold, Bill Brueggemann, Eric Buske, Scot Ford, Robin Spindler for Robert Houston, Kathy Moore, Mike Moser, Don Overman, Fred Ruiz, Bryan Tuma, Derek Vaughn, Terry Wagner and William White. **Members excused**: Robert Houston, Susan Jacobs, Gary Lacey and James Riskowski. **Staff present**: Michael Behm, William Muldoon, David Stolz, Bruce Ayers, Michael Overton, Jennifer Kirkpatrick, Audra Cook and Sarah Schoen. **Others present**: Robert Bell, Policy Research Office.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion

A motion was made by Moser and seconded by Vaughn to approve the minutes of the Crime Commission meeting of January 25, 2008; Nebraska Coalition for Juvenile Justice meeting of March 28, 2008; Violence Against Women Act Advisory Committee and Crime Commission Grant Review Committee meeting of April 2, 2008; Nebraska County Attorneys Standards Advisory Council meeting of April 10, 2008; Criminal Justice Information Systems Advisory Committee meeting of March 13, 2008; and the Police Standards Advisory Council meetings of January 16, February 20 and March 19, 2008. The motion passed unanimously by acclamation.

III. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Mike Behm presented his Executive Director's report noting the following:

- Jennifer Kirkpatrick has been promoted to Chief of the Grants Division.
- Jamie Rivera has been hired as the Juvenile Compliance Monitor for the Grants Division.
- He attended the following conferences/meetings since the last Board meeting in January:
 - Community Corrections Retreat - February 6, 2008
 - BJA Conference, Indianapolis, Indiana - February 11-14, 2008
 - Upon his return from this conference, he submitted two emails to all Crime Commission Board members informing them of the results of this conference and what is expected to happen with the Byrne monies.
 - Commission for Protection of Children - February 22, 2008
 - NCVC Luncheon - April 2, 2008
- He met with the US Attorney regarding Byrne and PSN on March 13, 2008.
- He conducted a meeting with the Task Force members regarding the Byrne funds and the Racial Profiling Committee meeting on March 18, 2008.

IV. OLD BUSINESS

A. State Budget Review/Byrne Money

Mike Behm reported that as per the Commissions instructions, Bruce Ayers and himself sat down and reviewed the Nebraska Annual Budgetary Report for June 30, 2007. The following was their findings from this review:

- Most state agencies carry over money from one fiscal year to another, which are refunded as valid encumbrances.
- Not all agencies are general funded, some are cash funded.
- Agencies range from \$164K to the largest at \$1.2B.

The conclusion they came to after reviewing this report is that with nearly 70 agencies, it is nearly impossible to pick out excess funds that they could justify recommending for the Byrne fund.

Overman asked if there has been any word from Washington referencing the status of the Byrne monies.

Behm responded by stating that he received an email on April 28, 2008 from NCJA stating the following:

- “A bill providing FY08 supplemental appropriations for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan has not yet been introduced in either chamber of Congress.
- NCJA held its annual Hill Day on April 20, 2008. NCJA members representing 13 states met with over 50 congressional offices to remind them of the impact of the cuts to Byrne/JAG on the state and to urge their active support for restoring the funding this year.
- The governors’ sign-on letter has been posted on the NCJA website with a total of 35 governors’ signatures, Governor Heineman included.”

Cookson informed the Board that Attorney General Jon Bruning spoke with Senator Nelson while they were completing their Amendment I commercial, and Senator Nelson informed Attorney General Bruning that he will be making it a high priority to get the bill into the war supplemental.

V. NEW BUSINESS

A. Crime Commission Budget Restraints

Behm informed the Board that all state agencies have been ordered by the Governor to implement budget restraints within their agencies. The following is what he has done to adhere to the Governor’s request:

- The Crime Commission is submitting a 97% budget.
- There are currently two vacant positions within our agency that will not be filled.
- Travel both in and out of state has been restricted to that of only absolute necessity.

B. 2008 Traffic Stops in Nebraska Annual Report

Cookson informed the Board that a copy of the 2008 Traffic Stops in Nebraska Annual Report was provided for their information.

C. 2007 Crime Commission Annual Report

Behm informed the Board that a copy of the 2007 Crime Commission Annual Report was provided for their information.

He also stated that this is the first annual report that has been compiled since he began working for the Crime Commission in May 2005. He felt it was important for the Crime Commission to highlight its responsibilities and duties not only because of the number of new Senators, but also to provide a general increased awareness about our agency.

D. 2008 Criminal Justice Directory

Cookson informed the Board that a complimentary copy of the 2008 Criminal Justice Directory was provided to them for their use.

E. Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center

1. Instructor Certifications

The Crime Commission next considered *one* request for **General Instructor Certification**, *three* requests for **Professional Instructor Certification**, *twelve* requests for **Professional Instructor Recertification**, *two* requests for **Legal Instructor Certification** and *two* requests for **Legal Instructor Recertification**. The Police Standards Advisory Council's recommendations were reported by Terry Wagner.

Motion

A motion was made by White and seconded by Ford to grant the following instructor certifications per Police Standards Advisory Council's recommendations: General Instructor Certification to Ross Lyon, Nebraska State Patrol; Professional Instructor Certification to Kenner B. Hatfield, Omaha Police Department, John Lehnhoff, Omaha Police Training Unit and Angela Richards, Omaha Police Department; Professional Instructor Recertification to Gregg M. Barrios, Omaha Police Department, Michael S. Bassett, Lincoln Police Department, Forrest Dalton Jr., Lincoln Police Department, Ann Heermann, Lincoln Police Department, Todd A. Hruza, Lincoln Police Department, William K. Koepke, Lincoln Police Department, Robert H. Kawamoto, Lincoln Police Department, Danny J. Reitan, Lincoln Police Department, Grant F. Richards, Lincoln Police Department, Donald L. Scheinost Jr., Lincoln Police Department, Dennis L. Scott, Lincoln Police Department and Tom Towle, Lincoln Police Department; Legal Instructor Certification to Brenda D. Beadle, Omaha Police Department and Jeffrey J. Lux, Omaha Police Training Unit; and Legal Instructor Recertification to Martin Conboy, Omaha Police Academy and Donald W. Kleine, Omaha Police Training Unit. Voting in favor of the motion: Arnold, Brueggemann, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn, Wagner and White. Motion carried unanimously.

2. Omaha Police Academy Inspection

Terry Wagner reviewed the recommendations of the Police Standards Advisory Council on the inspection of the Omaha Police Academy.

Motion

A motion was made by White and seconded by Tuma to approve the Omaha Police Academy Inspection per the Police Standards Advisory Council's recommendations. Voting in favor of the motion: Arnold, Brueggemann, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn, Wagner and White. Motion carried unanimously.

3. Approval of Operating Instruction 50-20; Receipt of Basic Student Information Forms and Tuition Payment

William Muldoon reviewed the proposed changes to Operating Instruction 50-20 (Receipt of Basic Student Information Forms and Tuition Payment) with the Board, which resulted in the Board making a motion to approve the proposed changes.

Motion

A motion was made by White and seconded by Vaughn to approve the proposed changes to Operating Instruction 50-20; Receipt of Basic Student Information Forms and Tuition Payment. Voting in favor of the motion: Arnold, Brueggemann, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn, Wagner and White. Motion carried unanimously.

4. Approval of Operating Instruction 50-41; Training Center – Student Health, Safety and Behavior Expectations

Muldoon reviewed the proposed changes to Operating Instruction 50-41 (Training Center – Student Health, Safety and Behavior Expectations) with the Board, which resulted in the Board making a motion to approve the proposed changes.

Motion

A motion was made by Ford and seconded by Brueggemann to approve the proposed changes to Operating Instruction 50-41; Training Center – Student Health, Safety and Behavior Expectations. Voting in favor of the motion: Arnold, Brueggemann, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn, Wagner and White. Motion carried unanimously.

F. Report on Compliance with 2007 Continuing Legal Education Requirements by County and Deputy County Attorneys

Behm reported that official notifications were sent to all County and Deputy County attorneys in noncompliance with Rule and Regulation, Title 78, Chapter 6.002 and .005 relating to the annual requirement of 20 hours of Continuing Legal Education.

He stated as per rule and regulation, if compliance is not reached or a request for a hearing with the Commission is not received within 60 days of the date of the mailing notice, the Commission shall report the noncompliance to the Attorney General for further action in accordance with Neb.Rev.Stat. §21-1212.

The Commission has received requests for waivers from all 20 County or Deputy County attorneys listed as out of compliance with their 2007 CLE requirements. All others have met their annual requirement for training in 2007.

A waiver will allow the deficit number of hours to be added to their 20 hour training requirement for 2008. The County Attorneys Standards Advisory Council recommended that waivers be granted to the 20 County or Deputy County attorneys as listed below:

- It was recommended that the following five attorneys be granted a waiver contingent upon them attending the 2008 Spring Conference or submitting a plan of how they will obtain the hours to bring them into full compliance for 2008. The five attorneys are: Jennie Dugan-Hinrichs, Douglas County, for 20 hours of training with one hour of crimes against children training; James M. Masteller, Douglas County, for 20 hours of training with one hour of crimes against children training; Shelly R. Stratman, Douglas County, for 20 hours of training with one hour of crimes against children training; George G. Vinton, Hooker County, for 13 hours of training with 1.5 hours of crimes against children training; and John H. Skavdahl, Sioux County, for 20 hours of training with 1 hour of crimes against children training.
- Aimee Sanderson Melton has resigned her position as a Deputy Douglas County Attorney. As a result, her waiver request for 16 hours of training with 1 hour of crimes against children training did not need to be considered and was stricken from the list.
- It was recommended that all remaining waiver requests be granted. The remaining waiver requests are as follows: Thomas S. Barrett, Douglas County, for four hours of training; Michael W. Jensen, Douglas County, for 11 hours of training; Thomas J. Kangior, Douglas County, for one hour of crimes against children training; Jennifer K. Meckna, Douglas County, for 2.75 hours of training; Paulette Merrell, Douglas County, for 9.75 hours of training; Leigh Ann Retelsdorf, Douglas County, for eight hours

of training; Randall Ritnour, Gage County, for one hour of crimes against children training; John Thomas, Knox County, for one hour of crimes against children training; Joseph M. Smith, Madison County, for one hour of crimes against children training; Steven M. Curry, Merrick County, for seven hours of training with one hour of crimes against children training; Jason C. Caul, Sarpy County, for one hour of crimes against children training; Nicole O'Keefe, Sarpy County, for 1.25 hours of training; Carolyn A. Rothery, Sarpy County, for 9.25 hours of training; and Michael A. Smith, Sarpy County, for one hour of crimes against children training.

A discussion ensued amongst the Board members as to what is actually required of the County and Deputy County Attorneys in regards to their continuing legal education and possible reasons why they have difficulty completing their requirements.

Motion

A motion was made by Overman and seconded by Vaughn to accept the County Attorneys Standards Advisory Council's recommendations to grant waivers of 2007 Continuing Legal Education requirements as follows: the recommendation that the following five attorneys be granted a waiver contingent upon them attending the 2008 Spring Conference or submitting a plan of how they will obtain the hours to bring them into full compliance for 2008. The five attorneys are: Jennie Dugan-Hinrichs, Douglas County, for 20 hours of training with one hour of crimes against children training; James M. Masteller, Douglas County, for 20 hours of training with one hour of crimes against children training; Shelly R. Stratman, Douglas County, for 20 hours of training with one hour of crimes against children training; George G. Vinton, Hooker County, for 13 hours of training with 1.5 hours of crimes against children training; and John H. Skavdahl, Sioux County, for 20 hours of training with 1 hour of crimes against children training.

The recommendation that the remaining waiver requests be granted with the exception of Aimee Sanderson Melton. The remaining waiver requests are as follows: Thomas S. Barrett, Douglas County, for four hours of training; Michael W. Jensen, Douglas County, for 11 hours of training; Thomas J. Kangior, Douglas County, for one hour of crimes against children training; Jennifer K. Meckna, Douglas County, for 2.75 hours of training; Paulette Merrell, Douglas County, for 9.75 hours of training; Leigh Ann Retelsdorf, Douglas County, for eight hours of training; Randall Ritnour, Gage County, for one hour of crimes against children training; John Thomas, Knox County, for one hour of crimes against children training; Joseph M. Smith, Madison County, for one hour of crimes against children training; Steven M. Curry, Merrick County, for seven hours of training with one hour of crimes against children training; Jason C. Caul, Sarpy County, for one hour of crimes against children training; Nicole O'Keefe, Sarpy County, for 1.25 hours of training; Carolyn A. Rothery, Sarpy County, for 9.25 hours of training; and Michael A. Smith, Sarpy County, for one hour of crimes against children training. Voting in favor of the motion: Arnold, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn and White. Voting against the motion: Brueggemann and Wagner. Motion carried unanimously.

G. Award of 2007 Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Grant Funds - \$952,898. Re-announce the \$29,471 Cultural Specific Community Based Organization Money with Next Grant Cycle

The Commission next considered requests for the 2007 Violence Against Women Act grant funds. Jennifer Kirkpatrick informed the Board that they had \$982,540 available to award, which is about \$72,000 less than what was available for 2006. She stated that this money is split into categories which must be applied to certain efforts. These categories are Victim Services, Law Enforcement Prosecution Courts and Discretionary. For the first time, this year 10% of the Victim Services money was required to be put towards a Community Based Cultural Specific Organization. Because of the planning involved and different requirements that programs must meet in order to utilize the 10% of Cultural Specific dollars, programs were unable to get their plans together in time for this money to be awarded. As a result, it is recommended this money be re-announced during the next grant cycle.

Kirkpatrick stated that 14 applications were received with one of the applications being a new program. Also, one grant application received was denied. The denied grant application was provided with the opportunity to appeal, but no appeal was received.

Motion

A motion was made by Wagner and seconded by Moore to accept the funding recommendations and contingency stipulations of award as outlined by the Grant Review Committee and the Violence Against Women Act Advisory Committee for the \$952,898 Violence Against Women Act grant funds and to re-announce the \$29,471 Cultural Specific Community Based Organization Money with the next grant cycle. Voting in favor of the motion: Arnold, Brueggemann, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn, Wagner and White. Motion carried unanimously.

H. Award of Juvenile Services Act 2008 Grant Funds - \$587,812

Audra Cook informed the Board that there was \$587,812 available for award. The total amount requested from programs was \$818,649, which is \$230,837 over the available amount for award. She stated that they reviewed 21 applications and denied four of them. These programs were given the opportunity to appeal the decision, but no appeals were received.

Motion

A motion was made by Moore and seconded by Vaughn to accept the funding recommendations and contingency stipulations of award as outlined by the Juvenile Justice Coalition for the \$587,812 2008 Juvenile Services Act grant funds. Voting in favor of the

motion: Arnold, Brueggemann, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn, Wagner and White. Motion carried unanimously.

**I. Award of 2007 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, Title II
Formula Grant Funds - \$507,177**

Cook informed the Board that the amount available for this grant is \$510,000. She stated they are only awarding \$507,177 at this time due to a mandatory Tribal pass through from the Federal Government. Because they did not have a Tribe apply this year, she is working with some Tribal contacts and plans to re-announce the Tribal specific funds. The total amount requested from programs was \$733,358, which is \$226,181 over the available amount for award. Cook informed the Board that they reviewed 17 applications and denied one of them. The program was given the opportunity to appeal the decision, but no appeal was received.

Motion

A motion was made by Moore and seconded by Brueggemann to accept the funding recommendations and contingency stipulations of award as outlined by the Juvenile Justice Coalition for the \$507,177 2007 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, Title II formula grant funds. Voting in favor of the motion: Arnold, Brueggemann, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn, Wagner and White. Motion carried unanimously.

**J. Award of 2008 Juvenile Justice County Aid Formula Grant Funds -
\$1,319,824**

Cook informed the Board that the total amount requested from programs was \$1,325,287, and the amount NOT requested was \$167,213. She stated that they received 41 grants, which consists of 55 counties. Because of information received that other counties may be applying, Cook informed the Board that they will be re-announcing the county aid funds that were retained or not awarded. However, due to LB 1014, this will most likely be the last year for this. This bill will allow retained or un-awarded county aid funds to be distributed competitively by the Crime Commission. The Crime Commission will look at the counties already applying for funds and give them the opportunity to apply for a support or enhancement grant, which would be a one-time project because this money cannot be relied upon year after year. Cook stated that a short enhancement grant application has been developed, and these funds will have to be spent by June 30, 2009. The estimated amount to be awarded for this is \$280,000.

Motion

A motion was made by Vaughn and seconded by Overman to accept the funding recommendations and contingency stipulations of award as outlined by the Juvenile Justice Coalition for the \$1,319,824 2008 Juvenile Justice County Aid grant funds. Voting in favor of the motion: Arnold, Brueggemann, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn, Wagner and White. Motion carried unanimously.

K. Award of 2008/2009 General Funds to Nebraska Crime Stoppers - \$13,457

Bruce Ayers informed the Board that \$13,457 has been earmarked for several years within our budget under general funds. This money is given to the Nebraska Crime Stoppers on a quarterly basis for their use with advertising, monthly meeting expenses, attendance at conferences, membership dues, maintaining their website and other basic operating expenses. Ayers stated that they do require the group to document all expenditures, and they track these expenditures to ensure the group is within the required spending guidelines.

Motion

A motion was made by Wagner and seconded by Tuma to approve disbursement of \$13,457 in general funds to the Nebraska Crime Stoppers for fiscal year 2008/2009 contingent upon receipt of general funds by the Commission. Voting in favor of the motion: Arnold, Brueggemann, Ford, Moore, Moser, Overman, Ruiz, Tuma, Vaughn, Wagner and White. Motion carried unanimously.

VI. OTHER BUSINESS

There was no other business to review at this time.

VII. ADJOURNMENT
